After Scott Frost won the \$30,100 Gotham Trot at Yonkers Raceway last Thursday night it was announced that it was the sixteenth straight triumph for the 4-year old son of Hoot Mon, whose driver is Joe O'Brien and owner Sol Camp of Shafter, Calif. He was the odds on favorite with the crowd of 18,476 and he ended a victory by three and a half lengths in the one and one-half mile race. Ladies First was second and Scotch Valley third in a field of eleven trotters. The time was 3:09.35 and the first money was \$15,050 which boosted the earnings of Scott Frost to \$278,185. The all time record for a trotter during his career is held by Pronto Don and the amount he won was \$332,363. Joe O'Brien announced to a reporter after the race was over that Scott Frost would be shipped to California by air to take part in the first leg of the \$75,000 American Trotting Classic to be raced at Hollywood Park October 27th.

Harry Hirsch's Convalr 2:01 won again at Uaratoga Raceway, N. Y. last Saturday night with George Mauger driving. The time was 2:04.25 and it was the final race for this season at Saratoga. We understand that Convalr is being shipped to Sackville Downs, Halifax, where he will race until closing date November 12th.

Blair Andrew paid a flying visit home early this week and we had the pleasure of a talk with him. He speaks very highly of the Saint John management and the treatment he has received there and told us that he will continue racing until November 12th.
