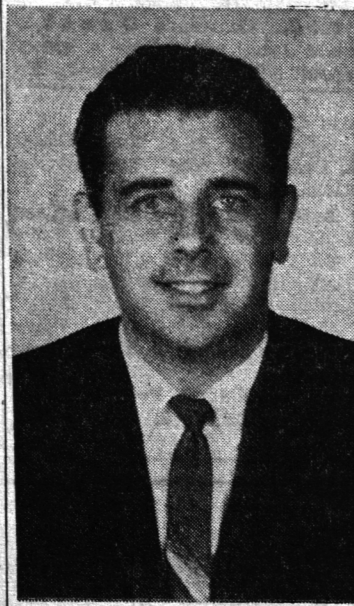

Top Spending Candidate Lost

OTTAWA (CP) — Reginald J. Dawson, Progressive Conservative candidate, spent \$32,924 in a bid to get elected to the Commons last March 31—and lost.

A Commons return showed Wednesday that Mr. Dawson was the highest-spending candidate in the last federal election. He lost in Montreal Mount Royal riding to Liberal Alan Macnaughton who spent \$24,995.

Of the four party leaders who ran for election, Opposition Leader Pearson spent the most — \$10,000. Prime Minister Diefenbaker spent \$6,451; M. J. Coldwell, defeated CCF leader, \$3,889; and Solon Low, defeated Social Credit leader, \$4,448.

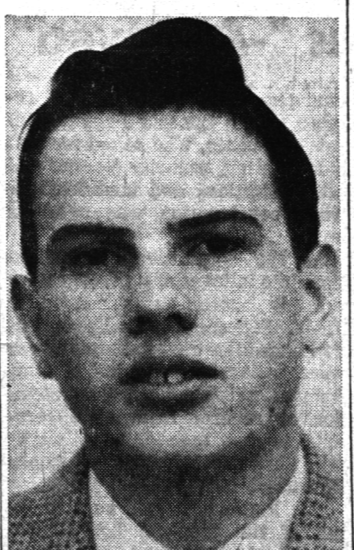

Islanders Will Be Prominent At U. C. Y. P. U. At Mt. A.

A young Summerside man, Carl Miller, has been chosen to attend the National Council meeting of the Young Peoples Union of the United Church of Canada. He will be representing the Central Presbytery area of P.E.I. at the sessions being held August 18 to 24 at Mount Allison University in Sackville, N. B.

The national convention, held every second year, brings together upwards of two hundred delegates and leaders from all parts of Canada and Bermuda. This is the first time it has been held east of Ontario, being arranged through the influence of the three present Maritime officers. Two years ago, the delegate was Miss Geraldine Woodside, Clinton, when sessions were held at Alma College, St. Thomas, Ontario.

This year, the other Island delegate is Miss Carol Thompson of Charlottetown, representing eastern P.E.I., while two years ago it was Miss Lorraine Coffin, Morell. As yet, no one has been chosen to represent Western Presbytery.

David MacDonald, Charlottetown, president of the host Maritime conference, will be heading the Island delegates. Rev. C.R. Webber of Summerside, is to be one of the discussion and study leaders. Rev. R. C. Chalmers of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, will be the special speaker, following the convention theme, "A Faith To Proclaim".

The week long program has daily lectures on the theme, study and discussion groups, Bible study, private and group devotions, business sessions, recreational activities, etc. Programs and policies are planned for future use in co-operation with the church's head office. During the week previous to the convention, delegates study materials and have personal special devotions arranged on a national basis.

Additional Project At RCAF Station Approved

OTTAWA. — (Special) — Additional work to be undertaken at the RCAF Station, Summerside, has been approved by the federal government.

Public Works Minister Green disclosed Thursday that a contract for \$22,000 has been awarded to Canadian Comstock Co. Ltd., Montreal, for construction of an underground electrical distribution system at the station.

REJECT OFFER

VANCOUVER (CP) — A union spokesman said Tuesday night a strike vote will be taken Monday among 1,300 longshoremen in five southern British Columbia ports following rejection of a conciliation board recommendation in their wage dispute. Spokesman for the International Longshoremen's Union said members voted 83 per cent for rejection of the board recommendation for a 10-cent increase in the hourly wage. A strike would affect Vancouver, Victoria, New Westminster and Chemainus docks and would be the first B.C. dock strike since 1935.

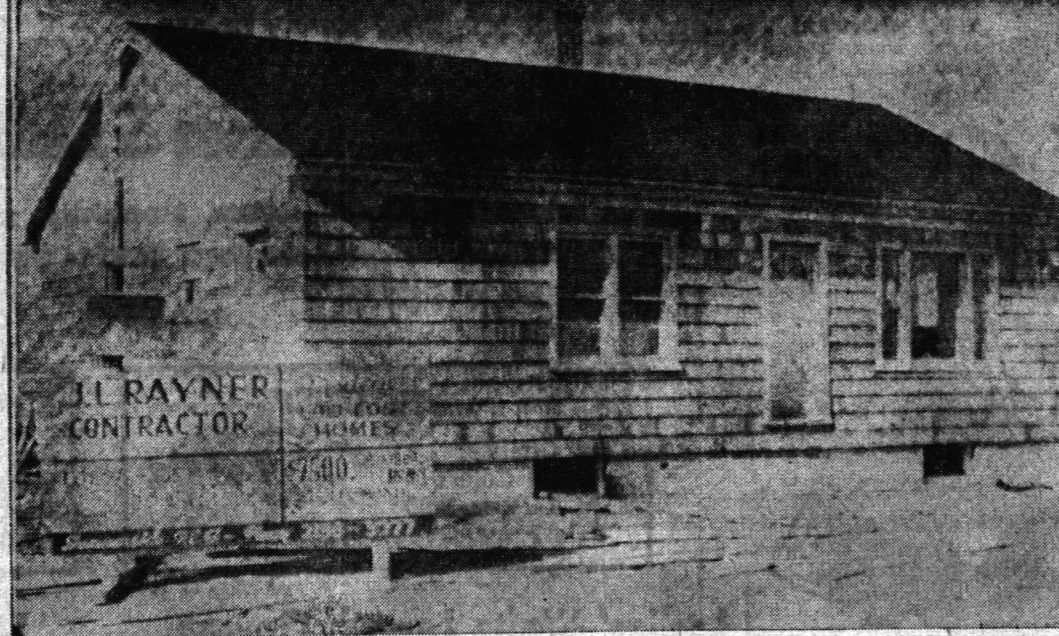
Odd Glass en Masse
