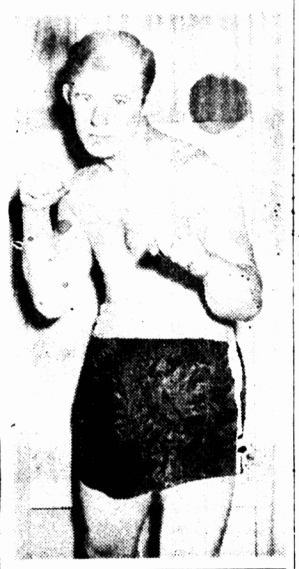

Smythe wants to arrange an exhibition tour for September in several European cities. He is primarily interested, however, in arranging games between the Leafs and Moscow Dynamos, world amateur hockey champions by virtue of their victory in Stockholm over Toronto East York, a senior B team.

Zaharias And Wife Sell Golf Course And Hotel

BEAUMONT, Tex., (AP)—George Zaharias said Wednesday he and his famous golfing wife, Babe, have sold their golf course and hotel in Tampa, Fla.
Zaharias said the Babe also has given up her duties as tournament arranger for the Ladies Professional Golf Association and the two intend to take a long rest from business.

He said Mrs. Zaharias, who underwent a cancer operation last year, was pronounced in satisfactory condition following preliminary physical checkups here. However, she is going to Galveston today for a more thorough examination.
The Babe told a reporter she may enter the Prince George open at Landover, Md., in mid-May. If her doctor says it's all right, she said she definitely will enter the Zaharias open next year.
Mrs. Zaharias played in all tournaments on the 1954 winter circuit. She won two and tied for first a third but lost out in a sudden-death playoff. She finished near the top in most of the meets, but she tired noticeably in the Zaharias open this month.

Charge "Sell-out" In British Empire Games Concessions

VANCOUVER, (CP)—The award of British Empire Games concession rights to a San Francisco firm has been termed "a sell-out" and a "kick in the face" to B.C. workers.
Delegates to a Trades and Labour Congress meeting here Tuesday said it was deplorable that concession rights should go to the United States while the union is attempting to deal with unemployment in B.C.

The games committee explained that the contract went to West Coast Concession in San Francisco after tenders were called.
It said the concession company was opening a branch office in Vancouver and would buy Canadian products if possible. Norah Scott, games secretary, said Canadian personnel would be employed except in key positions.

Ties Record In A. H. L. Scoring

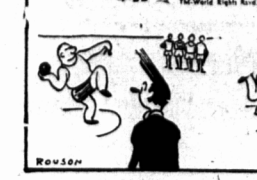
NEW YORK (AP) Jackie Gordon, centre and captain of the Cleveland Barons, tied a record in winning individual scoring honors in the American Hockey League playoffs.
Gordon had 18 points on five goals and 13 assists in nine games to equal the playoff scoring marks of Fred Thurston, Frank Mario and Barry Sullivan, all now retired from professional hockey.
Gil Mayer of Pittsburgh, the regular season's leading goal tender, led the playoffs on defence, giving up 13 goals in five games for an average of 2.60.
Fred Glover of Cleveland had the most goals, eight.

BROOKLYN (AP)—The Brooklyn baseball club cut loose four rookie pitchers Wednesday, reducing the size of the Dodger roster to 28.

Tonight under the roof of the Palestine National Gardens in Calgary 23-year-old Cobey McCloskey of Charlottetown will climb into the ring for the most important fight of his career. He will fight smooth punching Doug Harper, known in the mountain regions as Calgary's Brown Panther and known to followers of the fight game as the Canadian Light Heavyweight Boxing Champion. Harper is putting his crown in the line and ready to defend it by means of his most effective weapons—a looping left hook and a hard overhand right.

Twice within the past six months Harper has met rugged Yvon Durelle of New Brunswick. He won the title from Durelle last fall and later fought to a draw with the New Brunswick boy. The Calgary fighter is ranked eighth among the British Light Heavyweights and only three months ago fought Jimmy Byrne, the American who is rated as an outstanding prospect for heavy-weight laurels.

McCloskey has the benefit of years of fighting experience behind him. He participated in an intense training and fighting camp around New York during the past several months and should be in the best condition of his career. He has four fights in the States winning two and losing two. He defeated Paule Griffin, a highly rated boxer and lost of Ray Drake, a returned service man who once defeated Floyd Patterson in an amateur fight.

As far as is known here McCloskey will go into the ring around 157 pounds while Harper is expected to tip the scales at 174, one pound under the light heavy-weight limit. This gives the Calgary fighter a 17 pound weight pull over the City boxer. Harper will also have the home-town Calgary fans behind him. It would appear that McCloskey has a full evening's work ahead of him in his efforts to de-throne Harper.

There was another night a few years ago when McCloskey went into the ring with the odds stacked against him and he emerged victorious. That was the night he fought Yvon Durelle and astonished the fight crowd with a clean-cut decision over the highly rated New Brunswicker. Durelle fought Harper to a draw in their last outing so fight fans aren't advised to sell the City boxer short when he answers the bell tonight. He has a habit of coming up with the big fight at the opportune time and for Cobey this is the most opportune fight of his career.

Already they're talking in New Brunswick about what they'll do if McCloskey wins. A sports group in Moncton are planning to match McCloskey and Durelle in a title fight. Such a bout would pack spacious Moncton Stadium to the rafters and grease the pockets of the promoters handsomely. The lack of a boxing commission in this Province would make it impossible for a title fight to be staged here. In addition, there's bound to be plenty of competition from Gussie MacLellan of Sydney for such an attractive proposition.

The outcome of the fight won't be known here until after two o'clock tomorrow morning. There is a difference of three hours in time between Prince Edward Island and Calgary. The fight will likely get underway at ten o'clock Calgary time which is one o'clock Island time. Allowing the fight to run close to an hour it would be

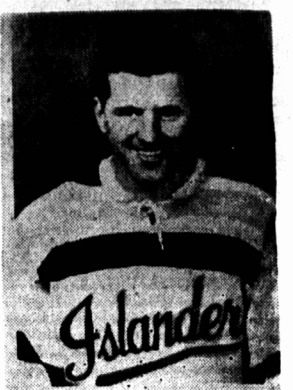
