Literature And Life

ON SUCCESS
What is success? I suppose I may safely say that a normal person, one who thinks of life seriously, would like to succeed. An early Greek dramatist said that success was man's god. But what is it to succeed?

It is not, for one thing, just recognition. There are those who equate success with a sort of superficial fame. I once knew a man who, in talking about a man whom he had known in former years said "I never see his name in the papers."

Nor is it just "getting on" - amassing wealth - for it is quite conceivable that principle and honesty might be violated. This need not be, but no doubt it sometimes is in the struggle to get wealth. Among a great many the idea of success is no better than one or both of these things.

Besides to be of some use in the world - to be always found on the side, and in the camp of those who are trying to make the world a better place - this too is to have one's face in the right direction.

Industry is necessary - hard time when there will be one world government, one religion, one system of weights and measures, one form of currency, one universal language, in addition to that now spoken by the various nations, and one transportation system linking the far-flung earth and its people together.

That day may not be in the near future, but with the whole world beginning to dress alike, act alike, demand the same things and expect the same high standard of living which we of the new world enjoy, is it not reasonable to visualize a time when a system of oneness in most things will be a must.

work often. "Scorning delights and living laborious days," these are conditions laid down for the student who would succeed. To try again if one does not succeed in the first instance is also a rule. Robert Bruce of Scotland learned by watching the spider, and Carlyle after one of his manuscripts was burned by John Stuart Mill's housemaid in lighting the fire, watched a brick layer at work and said, "If he does that by adding brick to brick, I can recover the contents of my book." And he did.

Did not Samuel Smiles, in "Self Help," affirm that we may learn oftentimes as much from a failure as from a success? Emerson, whose teaching has been tonic to many people, declared that "self-trust" had a large place in life, if one was to succeed. Patience too, is necessary. Patience with one's self and with the world. We recall how Disraeli failed in his maiden speech in the House of Commons. He sat down, but before that said, "You will listen to me one day." He said in one of his stories that the "secret of success is constancy of purpose."

Some years ago I read of a man who was candidate for an important position. He was one vote behind the successful competitor. But instead of feeling complimented in coming so close to a very able and well-known man, he became soured and went away to take a mental task among the mountains, soured because he thought the public had underrated his worth. He did not deserve to succeed. After all it lies with one's self, and success is not so much actual achievement as the spirit of the

one who strives. The old Pope, in "The Ring and the Book," has this to say: "Compel him strive, Which means, in man, as good as reach the goal."
