# Adams, Staff Smythe Have Something In Common

Jack Adams, a hard-bitten old hockey warhorse with Detroit Red Wings, and Staff Smythe, young hockey executive with Toronto Maple Leafs, have something in common.

Neither can stand the pressure of watching a tense game. They leave the arena and pace up and down outside until the crowds start leaving the building.  
Doctors say the strain of follow-

ing a tight game might be too much for Adams' heart. With Smythe, it's simply a case of nerves.  
Last week, when Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Montreal Canadiens 3-2 in overtime in the third game of their Stanley Cup series, Smythe was pacing up and down Church St., about a block from Maple Leaf Gardens.  
He knew immediately Leafs scored when a great roar from the Gardens shook the neighbor-

hood. The street was practically deserted and within seconds people who had been watching the game on television, leaned out windows beaming and laughing.  
Taxi-cab drivers, listening to the game on their car radios, stopped their cars and got out. "They just stood for a couple of seconds and then pushed off," Smythe told reporters.  
BIG LEAGUE CANUCKS  
A couple of Canadian big league

baseball players to watch this season are Ted Bowsfield, 21-year-old southpaw pitcher from Peniticon, B.C., and Reno Bertoia, 24-year-old second-baseman from Windsor, Ont.  
Bertoia, a good-field no-hit player with Detroit Tigers for three years, was traded to Washington Senators after the 1958 campaign. The new surroundings have worked wonders.

# Controversial Negro Star Is Performing Brilliantly

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Jerry (Pumpsie) Green, centre of a discrimination ruckus swirling around the Boston Red Sox, is doing all right with the Minneapolis Millers.  
The lean young Negro had two hits in four times at bat Tuesday night when Dallas defeated the American Association rivals 4-3. His performance against Fort Worth last weekend was, in the words of Minneapolis manager Gene Mauch, really tops.

The Red Sox have been accused of shifting Green to a farm club because he is a Negro. They deny this.  
"The fans in Houston and Fort Worth got on him pretty hard about it," Mauch says. "When he finally made an out in Fort Worth in the last inning, they

hollered that I'd probably have to write a letter to the NAACP explaining it.  
"But Green has never changed expression, never acted like he heard them. He came to us with a good attitude. He wants to play ball. He never mentions that other stuff."

**GOT FOUR HITS**  
In the two Fort Worth games, Green walked four times and got four hits in five official trips. He handled 18 chances and figured in four double plays.

**WINS BY TKO**  
CHICAGO (AP)—Spider Webb, No. 3 ranked middleweight, raked a bleeding mask on Neal Rivers and won on a technical knockout in 2:49 of the fourth round in their Chicago Stadium bout Wednesday night.  
In an action-filled third round,

Webb blasted Rivers to the canvas for an eight-count with a powerful right to the side of the head. In the same round, Rivers connected with a wild right square on the chin which sent Webb reeling back against the ropes.  
Webb, 27, from Chicago, was in complete control as far as the fight went, scoring his 33rd victory against four defeats. It was the second meeting between Webb and Rivers, 25, who was outpointed by the Spider in New York in 1957.  
All three officials had Webb ahead when referee Joey White stopped the fight.  
Webb, clamoring for a shot at middleweight Sugar Ray Robinson's 160-pound crown, jabbed and cruelly cut the surprisingly slow Rivers all the way.

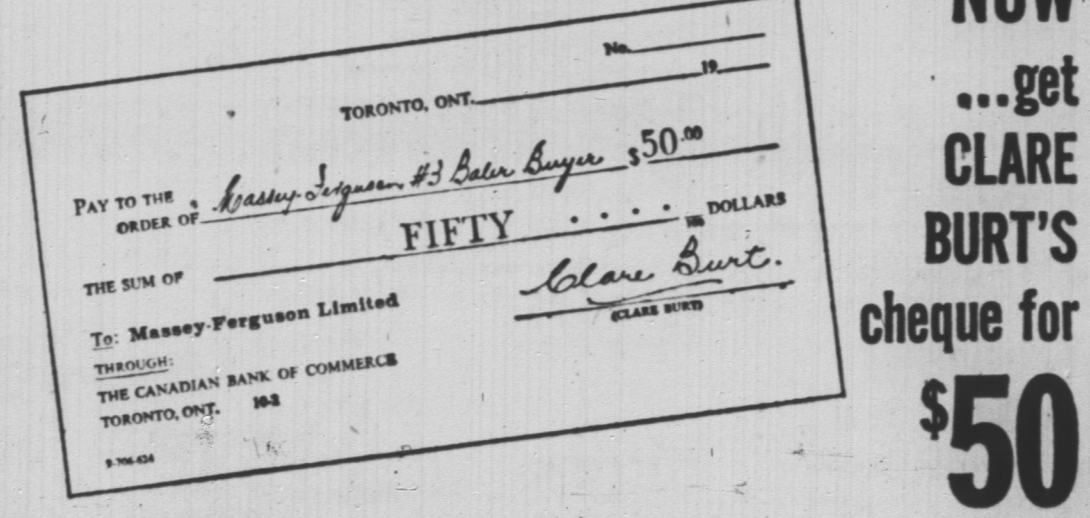

Cleveland continued to slug American League pitching to all corners of the lot, whipping Detroit 10-1 Wednesday for the Indians' eighth victory in nine starts.  
While Gary Bell helmed the Tigers to seven hits, J. Piersall, Rocky Colavito and rookie Gene Leek hit home runs. A small crowd of 3,254 spectators at Briggs Stadium booted lustily.

Boston broke loose with five runs in the fourth inning on the way to an 8-4 decision over Baltimore. Murray Wall who replaced Tom Brewer in the fifth, allowed only one hit in 4-1-3 innings and was credited with the victory over Arnold Portocarrero, first of Baltimore pitchers.

Indians rolled up a 14-1 score and collected 16 hits.  
Frank Lary was knocked out in the seventh inning after giving up 10 of the 15 Cleveland hits. Gail Harris' homer accounted for the lone Detroit score.
