LIQUOR QUOTA TO BE LIFTED

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Newfoundlanders will soon be able to buy an unlimited quantity of liquor each week, Premier Smallwood announced in the legislature.

He said a system dating back before Confederation under which a liquor permit was required and a limit of three quarts of hard liquor weekly was placed on individual purchasers was being abolished.

The changes were being made under a bill to be passed at this session in order to bring Newfoundland more in line with the laws of other provinces.

U.S. Farmers Cut Acreage

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. agriculture department has reported farmers intend to plant 305,000,000 acres to all crops this year compared with 307,000,000 last year.

This prospective acreage compares with the record low of 301,000,000 in 1961 but far below a high of 363,000,000 in 1951. This forecast was based on a farm survey of farmers' planting intentions as of March 1. Government controls designed to prevent surplus output will restrict production of most grains, cotton, rice, peanuts and some types of tobacco.

Larger acreages than last year were indicated for corn, durum wheat, barley, rice, potatoes, tobacco, dry beans, dry peas, soybeans and sugar beets. Smaller acreages were indicated for spring wheat other than durum, oats, flaxseed, cotton, sorghums, sweet potatoes, peanuts and hay.

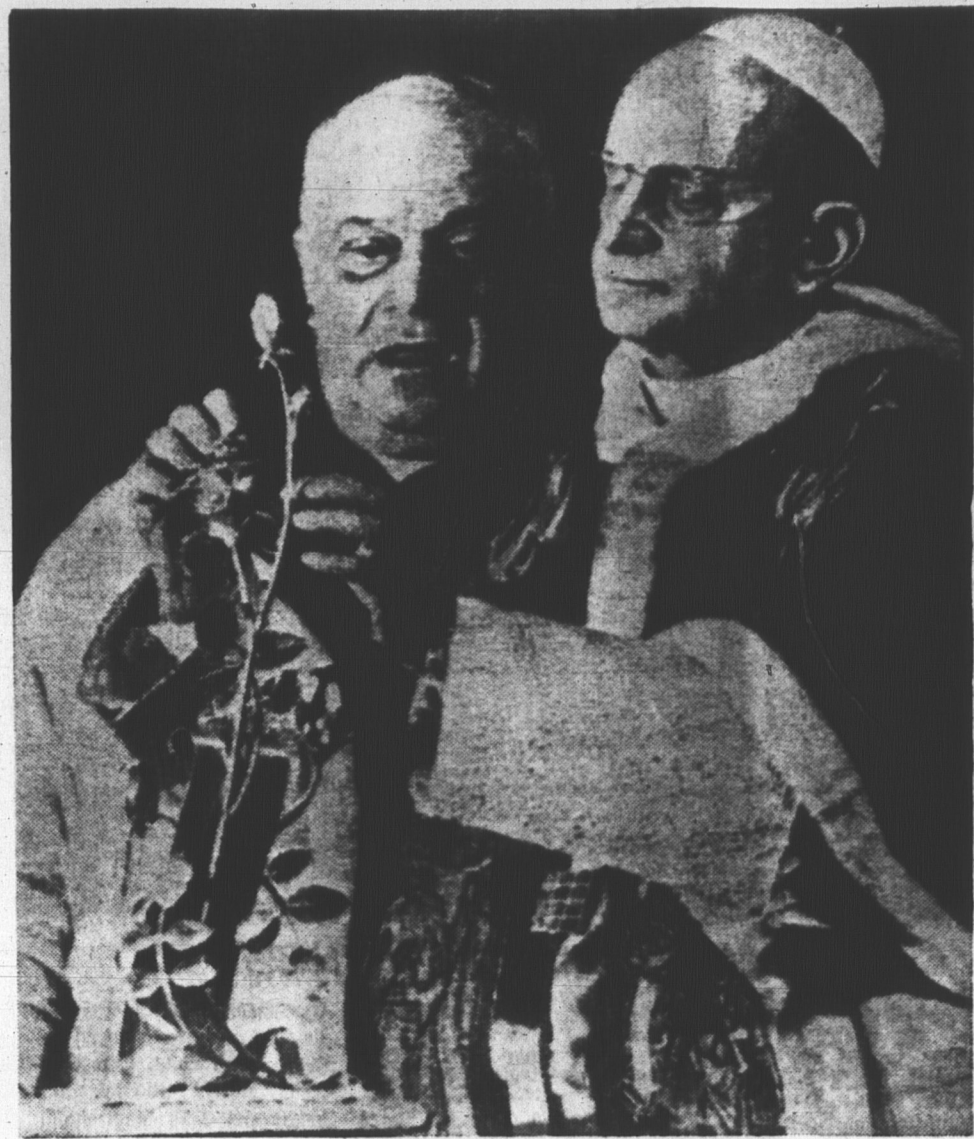
The department said that if the indicated acreages were planted and if yields were average with an allowance for trends, the production by crops compared with last year would include:

All wheat: 1,340,000,000 bushels compared with 1,326,747,000.
Winter wheat: 1,059,000,000 bushels compared with 1,024,076,000.
Spring wheat: 281,000,000 compared with 302,660,000.
Oats: 914,000,000 bushels compared with 959,192,000.
Barley: 406,000,000 bushels compared with 411,987,000.

Union Nationale Denies Link With New Party

QUEBEC (CP) — Opposition Leader Daniel Johnson, has denied in the legislature that there is any question of affiliation between his Union Nationale party and a new provincial party formed last Sunday. Commenting on published reports which said there was a possibility of such a coalition for the forthcoming provincial elections, Mr. Johnson said: "As far as I am concerned the Union Nationale is not interested in a common front."

"Faced with the confusion which reigns among the Liberals, faced with the lack of cohesion of the Liberal forces, it is not the time for the opposition to look like a party which has no doctrine and is ready to agree with any group to take power."
At the formation of the new party Sunday, its leaders said that they had approached the Union Nationale party but had decided against a coalition.



POPE BLESSES GOLDEN ROSE

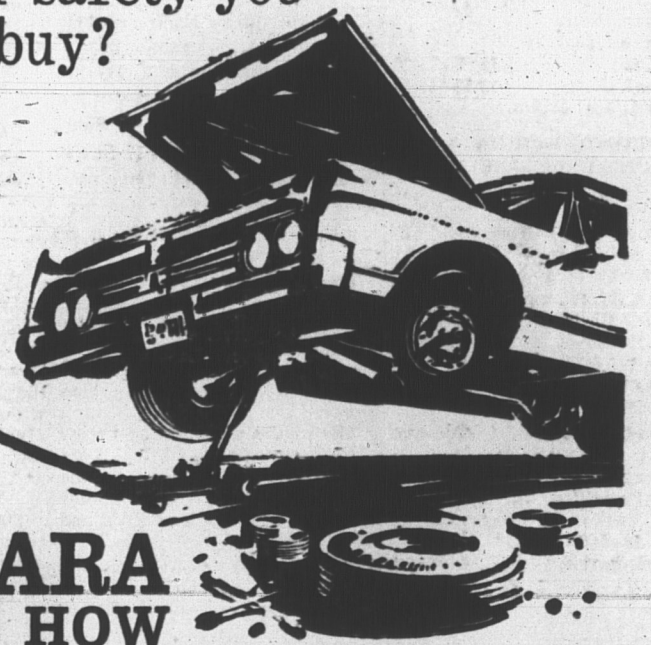
Pope Paul VI blesses a solid gold rose which he will send to the sanctuary of Our Lady of

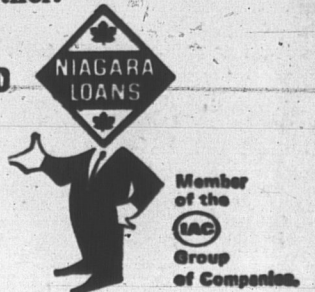
