S., was brought over in the steamer from Pictou last evening, and taken to the police station. After the usual examination and other formalities, she was removed to the Hospital for the Insane.

MOUNT ALLISON.—The anniversary exercises of the Mount Allison educational institutions at Sackville, N. B., are in progress. Several parents and friends of Island students are present. University Convocation will be held to-morrow. There are eighteen graduates this year—six from Nova Scotia, six from New Brunswick, four from P. E. Island and two from Newfoundland.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Official Circles Agitated.

OTTAWA, May 27.

The news of the sending of the English flagship Swiftsure and the Amphion to Sitka with orders to cruise in Behring Sea, has caused quite a stir in official circles and is received with much satisfaction. The Imperial authorities evidently deem such a step necessary against the absurd claim of the Americans in those waters. But while the presence of British ships will be a safeguard to Canadian vessels, a collision with American vessels, although possible, is not probable.

A Great Day for Canada.

MONTREAL, May 27.

Tuesday, June 4th, will see the opening of Canada's great railway of the new route to the Northwestern States by the Sault Ste. Marie route, known as the Canadian Pacific Soo Line. A train will leave here daily at 10 a. m. after the arrival of trains from Quebec, St. John, N. B., Portland, Boston, etc., and will run via Ottawa, the following morning reaching St. Paul and Minneapolis at 6 o'clock on the second morning.

A Writ Taken Out.

QUEBEC, May 27.

The owners of the steamship Polynesian have taken out a writ and summons in the Vice-Admiralty Court against the owners of the Donaldson liner Cynthia, for damages arising out of the recent disastrous collision. The amount claimed is £20,000 sterling. The Deputy Marshal of the Court has gone to Montreal to serve the writ.

The New Consul.

MONTREAL, May 27.

A private despatch received in this city this evening from Washington states that Senator Charles Knapp, of Lewiston, N. Y., has been appointed United States Consul at Montreal by the Harrison administration.

QUEBEC, May 27.

The new cable to Gross Isle is to be laid in a week, and the Government steamer Newfield has been ordered up here to perform the service.
