### May Increase Pensions Of Retired Clergymen

TORONTO (CP) - The pension board of the Church of England in Canada at the next general synod meeting will propose an increase in pensions for retired clergymen, their widows and children.

The increase, which would be effective Jan. 1, 1956, is dependent on synod approval of a two-per-cent increase in contributions to be paid by the salary source, which in most cases is the parish. The board, in a notice of motion placed before the executive council Friday, proposed that the pension for clergymen contributing to the plan now or in the future, be raised to \$30 from \$22.50 for each service year, the minimum to be \$1,200.

The proposed increase for bishops now contributing is the same, with an additional \$30 a service year while they are bishops. Minimum would be \$1,600 and maximum \$1,920.

Payment to widows would be increased to \$720 from \$540 and to children \$240 from \$180 up to the age of 18.

The board proposed that existing pensioners and widows as of Jan. 1, 1956, be paid a straight increase of \$5 a month for each orphaned child.

At present the rate of contribution is three per cent by clergy and seven per cent by the salary source.

## Modern Steel Dragger May Join Souris Fleet

There is a possibility that a steel dragger with a carrying capacity of 150,000 to 200,000 pounds of fish may join the fishing fleet at Souris next year.

Two business men from Iceland with long experience in the fishing industry, are combining with Island interests in negotiations for the purchase of a modern steel dragger in Europe.

Such a boat would have three to four times the cargo room of the draggers now operating out of Souris.

That such an ambitious venture in the talking stage, reflects the speed with which Souris is developing as a fishing centre and the growing realization of its key location as a Maritime fishing port.

With Griffith Fisheries opening a large new filleting plant in the spring, and a modern type fish meal factory due to go into production in February, more draggers will be needed to keep the workers busy.

A large dragger of the type proposed would go far to ease any shortage of boats which might arise, when two large plants are processing fish instead of one at a present.

### FISH MEAL PLANT

The fish meal establishment, to be known as Souris Sea Food Products, is located a short distance east of Souris, on the railway line. It will use fish offal from fishing points all over the Island. The new plant, designed to promote the most efficient production methods, is almost complete except for the installation of operating equipment. The various units of this equipment, however, are on the site, and it is hoped to start the wheels turning in February.

The planned opening of the fish meal plant in February, at a time when fishing activity is at a standstill, is at first sight an impossibility. But the company has a novel idea, which it is thought will supply the plant with the needed raw material.

The men behind the organization have noted that during the fall and winter months millions of small fish known as Caplin, swarm the coastal inlets and small harbors which dent the Provincial shore line.

Dense masses of these small fish very often deplete salt water ponds of oxygen and die in uncountable numbers.

Souris Sea Food Products believe that this supply can be harvested in sufficient quantities to keep its plant supplied with high grade raw material. Tons of Caplin can be taken from many small ponds and harbors by netting, in the opinion of company officials, and thus provide the means of giving winter employment to a number of men.

Meantime, developments in the eastern town are off on another track. The immense schools of herring known to frequent nearby waters reveals Souris as being in a very favorable position for the exploitation of this storehouse of a much-in-demand fish. That demand comes from areas of Europe, where herring are as much a staple commodity as is bread on this side of the Atlantic.

### EYES ON SOURIS

Certain European business men have already invested in ships and plants, with Pictou as a headquarters, to tap this rich reserve of herring and supply the overseas trade.

Other financial interests from Europe, after a study of map locations, see Souris as being better located than any port in the Maritimes for the establishment of a herring industry. These interests are now giving the town careful consideration as a base of operations.

With its fishing industry growing, Souris has problems deriving from expansion. A few years ago its pioneer fish-processing company, Eastern Fisheries, faced the task of training enough filleters and other workers, to handle all the fish the draggers were landing. That problem was met and overcome, even as the draggers doubled in numbers.

Next year Souris may be looking for draggers to keep the greatly increased processing facilities fully employed. The original problem may then recur, a shortage of skilled help.

This employment problem may mean, in the long run, the importation of help either from other parts of the Province, or from mainland points.

Already large numbers of people who live ten to fifteen miles from the town are needed to keep the fish plants in business.

### U. K. AIDS IRAN

TEHRAN, Iran (Reuters) - The Iranian finance ministry Thursday issued a communique announcing that Britain has offered a £10,000,000 credit to guarantee Iran's ability to meet her commitments with British industry. The credit bears four per cent interest, and will be repayable in five years, with payments starting at the end of the second year.

## Knowland Has No Plans of Resigning

WASHINGTON, (AP) - Senator William Knowland Rep. Calif. has told friends he has no intention of resigning as Republican Senate leader because of his public differences with President Eisenhower and State Secretary Dulles over some aspects of U. S. foreign policy.

Moreover, Knowland has asserted that in the unlikely event of a challenge to his leadership role in the new Congress, he will fight the issue out within the conference of all Republican senators.

There has been a great deal of speculation around Washington as to what touched off Knowland's proposal in the Senate Nov. 15 that Congress call state and defence officials and members of the joint chiefs of staff to determine whether any basic changes were needed in the Eisenhower administration's

foreign policy. Eisenhower said that some means of living together with the Russians must be found if the world is to avert destruction. Dulles said he saw no immediate emergency that would require a congressional review of foreign policy.

Although the White House disagrees with Knowland it has said repeatedly the senator is entitled to express his views.

Knowland feels strongly that he has that right in what he pictures to his colleagues as a dual leadership role. It is his conception that his responsibility lies both in interpreting the views of the Senate Republicans to the White House and in interpreting White House views to the senators, at all times trying to bring those views to the Eisenhower administration's
