

Tremblay And Canoe Lead Habs To Win Over Rangers

NEW YORK (CP-AP)—Montreal Canadiens defeated New York Rangers 5-3 in a National Hockey League game Sunday night with Canadiens' Dave Balon and Gilles Tremblay each scoring two goals.

The game was played before a sellout crowd of 15,925 at Madison Square Garden.

The triumph moved Tremblay into second place with two straight victories since Charley Hodge replaced injured Rene Worley in goal.

Bill Hicke notched the winners' other goal. For the Rangers, slender Camille Henry collected two goals and Andy Bathgate one.

Jean Beliveau picked up three assists for Montreal to give him a league-leading total of 20 points.

The Canadiens, who fired 59 shots at their former goalie Jacques Plante in a 6-2 victory in Montreal three weeks ago, took 42 shots this time. Hodge, whose stop on Don Marshall's penalty shot in the second period was the turning point of the game, came up with 71 saves.

The four goals in the first period, two by Balon and two by Henry, all came on power plays while the scored-upon team was shorthanded.

With Doug Harper in the penalty box for interference, Balon opened the scoring at 3:25 when Beliveau's passout from behind the cage caromed off one of his skates past referee Vern Bueley, was the first of the National Hockey League season.

The Canadiens took a 3-0 lead on Tremblay's goal at

on a short shot at 15:11, this time with Cahan off the boards, at 16:57, with Prost up in the box, Bathgate scored down the right side, passed in front of the goal where Henry took it in full stride and zipped a 10-footer past Hodge.

The Rangers missed an opportunity to go ahead at 14:30 of the second period when Don Marshall missed a penalty shot. After a short delay, he shot into Hodge's pads from 20 feet.

The penalty shot, called by referee Vern Bueley, was the first of the National Hockey League season.

The Canadiens took a 3-0 lead on Tremblay's goal at

10:40 of the second period on a rush that began moments before Phil Goyette's penalty expired. At 1:56 of the first period, the Canadiens went two goals ahead when Hicke surged past Langlois to score at the 1:50 mark.

Bathgate drilled a short shot at 12:12 to keep the Rangers alive but Tremblay clinched the game with his second score at 16:53.

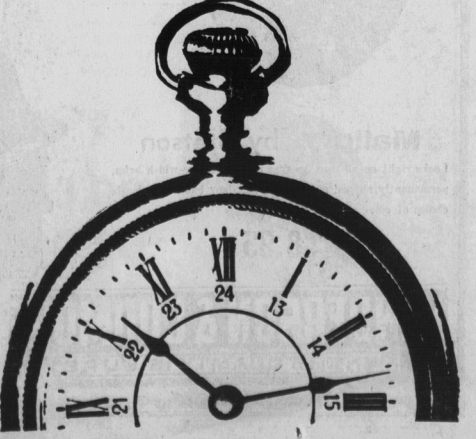
