Air Navigators Return From Arctic Training

Specialist navigators of the Central Navigation School at Summerside returned Tuesday afternoon after one week spent deep in the Arctic in the course of which a routine flight was made over the geographic north pole. This is an annual exercise carried out by the members of the specialist navigation course and their instructors which terminates the six months' course.

This year two Lancaster aircraft were used and the operation was based at Resolute Bay in the Eastern Arctic. It was found that by using a base in the Arctic instead of at Whitehorse in the Yukon, that much more use was made of flying time, because immediately they were airborne they were in the area in which they intended to carry out operations.

S/L G. C. Peake, who is in command of the operations, reports that most of the projects were successful, and from a training point of view all trips were worth while. One of the purposes of the operation, in addition to giving the navigators experience in Polar flying, was to test out new equipment. Daylight lasts just about the twenty-four hours in the Arctic this time of year and Tuesday night was the first period of darkness experienced by the fliers since they left here. The flight over the pole is officially described this way: "On May 1st while doing ice reconnaissance over the Arctic pack, the nature of the flight made it convenient to use the geographic north pole as a turning point."

The first few days they were at Resolute Bay the weather was fine and the sun shone all the time, but during the last three days there was a howling blizzard with the wind blowing the snow across the barren ice covered tundra at 50 knots. -S.

jurisdiction - had been given to the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board and not to the Island's Legislature.

He argued that the Supreme Court and the Privy Council already had upheld the principle of Parliament conferring powers on a provincially-created body apart from the Legislature.

Under Federal Authority He added the Federal Act "does nothing of the kind." The inter-provincial function of the Marketing Board would be under Federal authority.

He makes no distinction between the Legislature and the Board, commented Mr. Justice Robert Taschereau.

Mr. Varcoe also expressed the opinion the P.E.I. judgment was "pretty confusing" on another point. He claimed it did not make clear whether it was holding invalid the P.E.I. marketing legislation or the specific marketing scheme set up under that legislation.

Mr. Justice C. H. Locke also took issue with observations of Chief Justice Thane Campbell of P.E.I. that Parliament could not delegate powers to an agency created by a Legislature and be responsible solely to it.

"How would it explain how policemen, who enforce Federal laws, are appointed by the Province?" Mr. Justice Locke asked. "He is certainly a provincial appointee, exercising powers conferred by parliament."

Mr. Justice I. C. Rand said there is nothing to prevent a person being accountable to the provincial government for one set of duties and to the Federal Government for other functions.

Appearing with the Federal Government in arguing against the P.E.I. judgment are the governments of that Province, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. Argument in the test case, which opened today, is expected to take up the remainder of the week.
