"If we are to bring the Atlantic Provinces up to the standard of the rest of Canada we must make the educated people do it," Dr. C. B. Stewart, dean of medicine at Dalhousie University, said last night during an address to former students held at Monagony Hall, P. E. I.

Dr. Stewart, a native Islander, returned briefly yesterday to speak at the opening of the university's campaign for funds to enable it to carry on the professional education of the people of the four eastern provinces.

In asking support for the fund, Dr. Stewart noted that in relation to population Prince Edward Island needs more students to the facilities of medicine and dentistry at Dalhousie than any other of the Atlantic Provinces.

# ISLANDERS' CO-OP Amalgamated Dairies' Sales Top \$1 million

**SUMMERSIDE** — The annual meeting of Amalgamated Dairies Ltd., in Summerside last night reported a financial statement showing sales of more than \$2,000,000, from the production of over 1,700,000 pounds of butter, 900,000 pounds of cream, 400,000 quarts of milk, and a 20 per cent increase in ice cream sales.

The company last year showed a total income of \$2,014,657.20, from which directors received \$1,860,431.27 for milk and cream, plus an additional \$55,333.05, in bonus shares, cash and interest.

The annual balance sheet showed the company has a sound net worth of almost \$470,000 of assets over liabilities.

## SPACE EXPERT DIES

**ACHEN**, West Germany (AP)—Dr. Theodor von Karman, 81, internationally known space scientist from Pasadena, Calif., died in hospital here of a heart attack, officials announced Tuesday. Von Karman was chairman of NATO's advisory group for aeronautical research and development in Paris. Officials of Aachen's technical university reported he was visiting this city when he was stricken and died.
