Prince Co. Vocational School Opening Tues.

The official opening of the Prince County Vocational School Tuesday will draw numerous guests and provincial dignitaries. Principal Cameron MacDonald said this weekend.

Special guest speaker at the ceremonies will be Don Loney, celebrated coach of the St. F.X. X-Men, who has been dominating the Maritime football scene for years.

In the afternoon Mr. Loney will address a student assembly which will include both students of the vocational school and other schools. Premier Walter Shaw and Hon. L.G. Dewar, M.D., minister of education, will also be present.

Following the banquet guests will return to the vocational school where at 7 o'clock, parents and interested citizens will be heard including Premier Walter Shaw and Dr. Dewar.

Parents will also have an opportunity to meet the instructors and teachers, Mr. MacDonald said.

ALBERTON — William (Bill) Profit of Alberton is the first man in this province to receive a certificate for weaving.

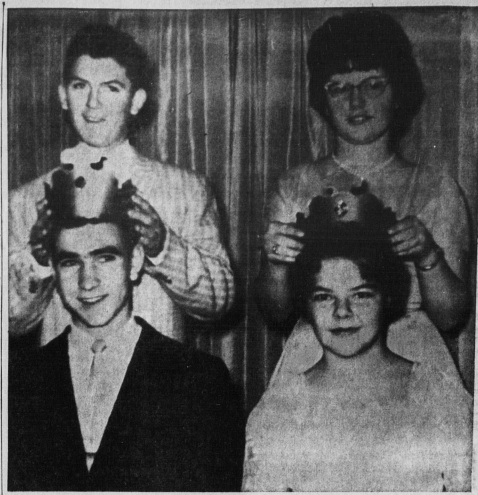
He was one of four Alberton residents who received their certificates Friday evening from the hands of Miss Alexander, acting director of handicrafts for Prince Edward Island.

Premier Shaw Speaks At St. Andrew's Dinner

Guest speaker Premier Walter R. Shaw chose as his topic a trip to Scotland made a few years ago and Robbie Burns in addressing guests at the St. Andrew's dinner held at the Royal Canadian Legion home here Saturday night.

In discussing Scotland, Premier Shaw said "I was tremendously impressed with Scotland, the people, their hospitality, their common sense."

Referring to the great Scottish bard, Premier Shaw said "Burns' death exemplified the yearning of the Scottish people; no one was held in greater regard." He added "Burns is not acclaimed by Scotland alone, but by all nations."

The premier recalled that during a visit to Denmark representatives of 32 national associations of "Auld Lang Syne" and he remarked that "the (Burns) has bequeathed to the young men the words of freedom. He knew the sorrows and joys of the common man; the essence of his teachings was freedom of state."

NO BODIES INTACT
No complete bodies had yet been found. Pieces of human beings and personal effects were brought to a temporary morgue at a nearby army installation. A medical unit from RCAF Downsview, Ont., also moved in to determine whether any "human factors" were involved in the crash.

Richard Bolduc, chief investigator for the transport department, took charge at the scene late Saturday. A medical unit from RCAF Downsview, Ont., also moved in to determine whether any "human factors" were involved in the crash.

Although Quebec provincial police and soldiers still stood guard of the crash site, 800 feet west of Highway 11, one of the main routes to the Laurentian resort area, Friday and Saturday's spectators had been driven away by the freezing weather.

The crash was the worst in Canadian aviation history and the second worst, single-plane crash in world aviation.

The jet—flight 801—took off at 6:28 p.m. and four minutes later plunged into the marshy fields near this community of 1,000, some 20 miles north of Montreal. Most of the victims were from Toronto and other Ontario cities.

Ninety-two passengers were from Ontario, 70 of them from Toronto, 17 from Greater Montreal, five from Western provinces, one from New Brunswick, two from the U.S. and one from India.

SEE EXPLOSION
It was not clear whether the plane was blown to pieces on hitting the ground, barely 800 feet from the runway, or if the main rotor burst through the fuselage, or whether, as those there at the time reported, it exploded before the crash.

In a statement issued Saturday, C.A. President G. R. McGregor said, "No possible cause should be ruled out with two exceptions. There was no detectable mechanical fault with the aircraft before departure and the crew was well trained."

"There are two trained teams, the department of transport and TCA, investigating and they will do their very best, and if there is anything to be found about the cause, they will find it."

Constable Noel Aubertin of the St. Therese police, apparently the first person to reach the crash scene, was leaning out of his patrol car talking to two children along the highway when it happened.

After alerting town and provincial police on his car crash, "I ran so fast to the crash in my mind I lost my boots, both my boots."

Welfare Agency Needing Support

William M. (Bill) Jay was a recipient of a grant from the Prince County Catholic Welfare Agency at the agency's annual meeting yesterday afternoon.

In his report Mr. Jay said "while our participation in United Fund has increased our general revenues substantially, we nevertheless find it extremely difficult to maintain our operation in solvency and still answer the many requests made for our assistance."

He added "quite frankly we feel that some of the rural parishes could be more receptive of our cause both financially and otherwise — it must also be born in mind that Charlottetown and Summerside contribute almost 80 per cent of the United Fund proceeds."

BIG MOOSE BAG

It was estimated in the treasurer's report, given by Natalie Arsenault, C.A. that by the end of December the total revenue for the agency would be \$22,329 and the total expenses \$29,827, making for a net excess of expenses over revenue of \$1,598.

COUNTY STUDY
The president said that Peter Ungermann of Union, N.E.W. Jersey who was hired this year as family counselor had undertaken a study of the county from the standpoint of social and economic ills and his report showed that "because of lack of ed-

Mr. Jay told the meeting "it is my duty to advise you that if our agency is to continue in operation and to meet the growing demands made upon it, then we must seek and find new avenues from which additional revenues may be obtained."

Once again the Summerside Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion is generously providing its auditorium as clinic headquarters, and the Summer Red Cross branch, under Miss Gladys Holman's direction, is lining up the large number of volunteers required to assist the mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax.

Clinic hours follow the usual pattern established for Summerside 2-4 in the afternoon and 7-9 in the evenings each day. It is expected that at least 500 donors. In order to attain this registration it is most imperative that the afternoon stream of donors all the time during the hours that the clinic will be operating, according to Red Cross officials.

Mr. Delghan said last night that it would be helpful if all those who can possibly do so would make every effort to assist the afternoon clinic, and to bring their coloured cards to the evening hours. Merchants and heads of business establishments have been contacted. Mr. Delghan reported, and asked to consider allowing employees time off during the afternoon to attend the clinic in order to alleviate the usual crowding which occurs when anyone waits until the evening.
