Blood Donors Are Sought For 8 Clinics This Week

Being a laboratory technician at the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Sub-Depot here is not just an ordinary eight-hour a day task. Mrs. O. W. Campbell and Mrs. Bruce MacPherson, who are the present lab technicians, are both at the lab every day, but in addition to this day-time duty, they take week about to be "on call" at night, and there are many nights that this means practically no sleep for the one on call.

Each bottle of blood given to a patient must be carefully cross-matched with a specimen from the patient. This entails a great deal of responsibility for the lab technicians who must be very meticulous in every step of the intricate cross match which requires about two hours to complete.

In the first eight months of this year, 2,381 bottles of blood have been cross-matched for 554 patients who received transfusions. 14 RH negative babies have had complete blood replacements so far this year, and these lab technicians have done no less than 413 routine RH investigations at the request of family physicians for pregnant

women—this represents about 52 each month.

O RH Negative blood, for which there is always such a concentrated search, has been very much in demand, especially for emergencies as the result of accidents and haemorrhages, as well as for the RH baby replacements. The concerted drive for this type of blood has met with good response in the two previous series of clinics conducted by the Red Cross in this province so far this year.

At the April series held in Charlottetown, 99 of the 1,273 donors registered were O RH negative, while 141 of the 1,384 donors at the June Clinics held entirely in Prince County, were

this type. It is to be hoped that the results of this week's clinics to be held at North Rustico, New Glasgow, Canoe Cove, Eldon, Cardigan, Souris, Murray River and Montague, will produce an equally large percentage of this type of blood among the 1,152 donors being sought.

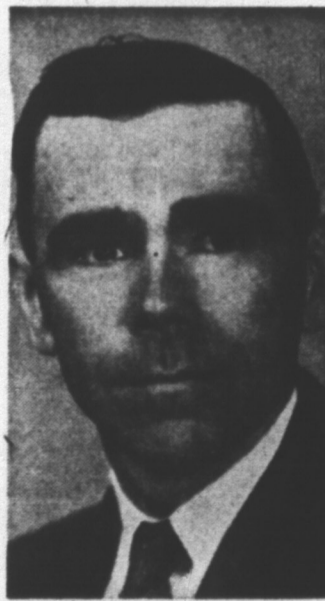

Election Result Is Vindication Of Joe's Fight

LONDON (CP) — The Times says Premier Smallwood's victory in the Newfoundland election is vindication of his battle against the influence of an American trade union in the province's log-

ging industry and of his championship of provincial rights against the federal government. But the independent newspaper emphasizes that Smallwood, as the leader of the fight to bring Newfoundland into Confederation, can be counted on to keep it there, regardless of his disputes with Ottawa. The Times notes that a provincial victory by a party in opposition in the federal field "is part of the pattern of Newfoundland political life and indeed of the political life of all Canada."

The Hon. Angus MacLean, minister of fisheries, accompanied by Hon. John A. Macdonald, M.P., for King's County, completed a tour of harbours and fish processing plants in Eastern Kings Saturday evening with a supper in Souris.

The tour included Savage Harbour, Red Head, Naufrage, North Lake and Souris. At each place groups of fishermen met with the minister and discussed local problems and the possible method of improvement.

In the afternoon at Souris, the minister accompanied by Mr. Macdonald, M. J. McQuaid and John R. MacLean held an informal meeting with the inshore fishermen in the warehouse on the railway wharf, due to inclement weather. Fishing problems were dealt with and harbor improvements to give the small inshore boats more protection and better facilities for working at their boats were discussed. A tour of Eastern Packing Co., and Usen Fisheries processing plants followed this meeting.

In the evening a supper was held in the Sea View Hotel. Mr. MacLean addressed this gathering at some length explaining the functions of his department and congratulated the people in the area for the success they made in their new industry.

NOW UNLOADING
