ROVER'S TAKE LEAD IN CITY BASEBALL LEAGUE PLAYOFF

Error In First Of Ninth Leads To Northend Team Scoring Only Run Of Game

A missed third strike by the Anchors' catcher that would have retired the side in the first of the ninth inning, allowing Leith Jay to score from third base, yesterday gave the northend Rovers a 1-0 victory over the Anchors in the first game of the City League baseball playoffs.

Held to two hits by the superb hurling of Alkie McCormack, Rovers crashed in on the only opportunity they had to score all through the game. Up to the time of the disastrous error in the ninth Rovers failed to get a man as far as third base while they themselves were forced to snuff out dangerous Anchors' threats in the opening and middle of the game. But a base on balls to Jay with one out put the winning run on the bats, Jay attempting to steal second, paraded McCormack of the Anchors and the throw to the sack was slow; Fred Whelan struck out to make the second out of the frame and McCormack saw his third strike on McKinnon when the next batter sail past only to have the ball slip through his catcher's glove for the run that meant the game.

It was easily the best played game of the season. Both teams were right on their toes all through the eight scoreless innings waged with several beautiful fielding plays drawing the fans off their seats. And it was also a brilliant hurling battle between McCormack of the Anchors and Skinny McKinnon of the Rovers. McCormack had an edge on his leg but McKinnon wasn't far behind as he limited the opposition to four hits throughout the game and given the lead in the first of the ninth he bore down hard to get the Anchors on the next frame after The Williams had singled with two out and gone to second on an error by the centre fielder. The tying run was on the bats but Whackey McCormack getting one of his teams two hits threw out Ryan to end the game and give the Rovers an edge in the best of five series, second game of which will be played this evening.
