

Weather Holds Up Harvesting On The Prairies

OTTAWA (CP) — Cool, wet weather held up harvesting of the Prairie's big grain crops last week, but despite difficulties the general outlook is still good, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday.

A telegraphic survey, based on reports reaching the bureau Tuesday night, told of heavy rains causing considerable flattening of crops throughout the Prairies and weathering of cut grain.

The harvesting delay, caused by the heavy rain, was particularly extensive in eastern Manitoba. "But elsewhere operations should commence within a few days given good weather," the bureau said.

DYNAMITE NEWS AGENCY

The explosion, which caused no casualties and only slight damage, is believed to have resulted from Egypt's naming of the agency's manager in Cairo, James Swinburn, as the leader of an alleged spy-ring.

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QUIZ

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

South	West	North	East
1 ♠	Pass	2 ♠	Pass
2 ♠	Pass	2 ♠	Pass

What do you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠K4 ♥AK742 ♦6 ♣AJ653
2. ♠5 ♥AQ764 ♦A8 ♣KJ742
3. ♠J4 ♥QJ953 ♦AQ ♣AKQ6
4. ♠862 ♥KQJ83 ♦A ♣AJ92

1. Three spades North's two spade bid, although it is simply a repetition of his suit and therefore not regarded as a strong bid, nevertheless stipulates a type of hand in which we should be interested. That hand has at least six spades and is practically guaranteed. His failure to pass two clubs or give a preference to hearts indicates substantial trick-taking values, provided, however, spades are trump.

The adequate spade support, in view of North's rebid, and the singleton diamond, as well as the extra high card values, are all factors which have not yet been represented. The game if it exists at all, is marked to be in spades, and he should be encouraged by us to bid it.

2. Pass. There is no use fighting the cards. This is not a game hand and the only issue to be settled is the best contract at which to play for a part score. In view of the obvious misfit, our opening bid has become strictly a minimum.

Partner may very well make four of five trump tricks at spades, which, added to our high card values, might readily result in a plus score. Further efforts on our part to find a better resting place are apt to create a worse situation. Partner has already said no to both our suits.

3. Three notrump. No further opportunity to play for less than game should be granted to partner. The 19 high card points plus partner's two bids add up to a healthy outlook for game.

Partner's hand may, of course, inflexibly point to a spade contract, but we are certainly prepared to abide by such a decision on his part, considering that we will contribute the J-4 of trumps to a suit he has bid three times.

4. Four spades. The jump to game, in the light of the meagre trump holding, may appear to be a decided overbid. Actually, the repetition of the spade bid makes the prospect of losing four tricks very remote.

Point-count bidders may find it difficult to reconcile the recommended four spade bid with the given hand. This is one hand where the logic of the situation demands a game contract even though the point count does not appear to warrant such unilateral action.

Requests Advertising Advisory Committee

TORONTO (CP)—The Association of Canadian Advertisers Wednesday released a letter to Finance Minister Harris urging the federal government to establish an advertising advisory committee.

The committee would study the situation involved in the proposed application of a 20-per-cent tax on advertising in the Canadian editions of foreign magazines, scheduled to go into effect next Jan. 1. The tax was announced in the last federal budget.

The association's letter said newspapers, radio, television and the Canadian consumer will feel the impact of the tax.

The 170-member ACA said an advertising advisory committee could make recommendations to help Canadian media.

BOOST ADVERTISING RATES

The letter followed announcement last week of a 13-per-cent advertising-rate increase by Beach's Digest and said a similar one is to be announced by Time Magazine.

It said: "Every indication points to the fact that budget reallocation, because of this tax, will draw advertising dollars away from Canadian magazines. Last May we produced figures to show that even higher advertising rate increases than have been announced would have little effect on the amount of space bought in the Canadian editions by national advertisers."

"We are convinced now, more than ever, that your new tax will harm not only Canadian magazines, but, in time, daily newspapers, radio, television and other Canadian media as well."

"ACA now feels that the sensible course open is the one we suggest, a committee to watch trends in media selection as a result of the tax. The committee can then study the situation as to how this tax adversely affects Canadian magazines, newspapers and other media and bring forth healthier and more constructive recommendations."
