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March Comes Into P.E.I. Like The Proverbial Lamb crack at the wintering birds off the Port Joli area. An eye witness told me that the season did not close on January 31st but continued on until well on in February. I said to him: "Who would shoot ducks in February? His answer really gave me the chills "Lots of the 'big shots' do". He told me that one rough, stormy afternoon, three hunters shot an offshore island all afternoon and until late evening. Two men watched the slaughter. When the dory came ashore it held over 70 ducks. The witnesses figured they had shot more than that and rowed out to look the ground over and found an additional 40 ducks the poachers did not take the trouble to retrieve. They were reported I was told but up until an approximate 10 days later no prosecution proceedings had been started. I asked: "Why?" and got the answer I figured I'd get: "That trio carry a lot of weight."

It's our local ducks that have their backs against a brick wall with special emphasis on our local black ducks. Every week I have old time duck hunters stop me and talk about what the future holds for our local black ducks. Several have stated that they are practically non-existent and our only hope of saving them is to close the season on ducks while there is yet time to save enough to furnish sufficient breeding stock to bring our Atlantic Flyway back into the limelight. I had a long chat with some Nova Scotia duck hunters a week ago. They told me that the winter open season along the south shore of the province is nothing more, or nothing less, than a crime against our waterfowl. I was told that the season closed in this area on January 31st. They had everything their own way... along the south shore of the province that had two seasons... October 19th to October 16th and from November 3rd to January 31st, 1965. The six open days in October was to give hunters a chance to harvest the local crop and the November 30th till January 31st, 1965 season was to give them a
