DECAY OF CHAPERON.

The South African war seems to have had one most unexpected result. It appears to have swept away a British social institution. Lady Jeune, well known as a shrewd inside observer of British society, declares in the Fortnightly Review that the chaperon has been de-throned, and her fall came about quite simply. In the midst of war, with fathers, husbands, sons and brothers at the front, English society could not make merry. When the tension was somewhat relieved it seemed possible to let the young people enjoy themselves in some simple way without the usual formalities. Mothers gave half-hearted consent, and "the Rosebud ball" was inaugurated. During the last year London society for the first time admitted the possibility of young women's attending evening parties un-attended by chaperons. Lady Jeune, although one of "the ostracized class of chaperons," admits that the experiment had no bad results. "The whole evening," she says, "passed as if a regiment of chaperons had been in attendance."

She notes a certain bareness of the ballroom owing to the absence of the usual matronly background, but confesses that "not even the most obstinate pessimist could find anything at which to protest." While regretting the chaperon's fall, Lady Jeune fears no evil from her absence. She finds in the greater independence of young women a new safeguard. Nor is she afraid of "the new woman." "Women," she acutely observes, "must always be what men best like them to be. The old Mother of Worlds will not permit them to unsex themselves and destroy what gives them their charm and power." This is consoling, if not

quite convincing, to those who have traced to "the new woman" a decline in masculine courtesy. The passing of the British chaperon is a revolution deserving the social philosopher's attention, for it is a step toward that uniformity of manners which seems destined to prevail in all civilized nations. Under the chaperon's sway British society held the middle ground between French, where the unmarried woman is nothing, and American, where she has been pretty nearly everything. The British chaperon was like some majestic ruin—an impediment and yet an ornament. As an institution she had outlived her usefulness, yet none will resent the departing generation's sigh over her fall.
