**Canadian Dollar Lowest For Year**  
NEW YORK, (CP)—The Canadian dollar reached its lowest point in more than a year in foreign exchange dealings here Wednesday. It dropped 1/4 of a cent to a premium of 1 1/2 per cent, three cents below the record of 104 11-32 set Aug. 13, 1952.

Since the beginning of the year, when Canada's dollar carried a bonus of more than three cents when matched with a U.S. dollar, the premium has been in a gradual but steady decline.

Banking sources here say slow movements of Canadian grain are having an adverse effect on the exchange rate of the Canadian dollar.

## China Hits U. S. Indo-China Policy

TOKYO (AP)—Communist China attacked U.S. policy on Indo-China Wednesday and declared "We certainly will not take it lying down" against aggression is directed against us."

People's Daily, official organ of the Red regime, said Red China now is one of "the five big powers" with a "soaring international prestige and position."

"The rulers of the United States, however, are trying to blind themselves to the existence and might of the People's Republic of China," said a Peiping broadcast version of the editorial heard here.

People's Daily was discussing the Geneva conference on Korea and Indo-China, which opens next Monday. The broadcast obviously was intended as a major pronouncement just before the sessions open.

## Canadian Film Awards Announced

OTTAWA (CP)—The award for "Canadian film of the year" has been won by Christopher Chapman of Toronto for his color production "The Seasons." Canadian Film Awards announced Wednesday.

The award to the top film of 1953, a 16-mm, non-theatrical production which runs 18 minutes, is sponsored jointly by the Canadian Association for Adult Education, the Canadian Film Institute and the Canada Foundation.

Non-theatrical—sponsored by a non-government agency: "Episode in Valleydale," by Crawley Films Limited, Ottawa, for the Manitoba pool elevators.

The right leg of Ron Pasowitsky, 13, was amputated below the knee a week ago after a January hockey injury induced a cancerous condition. Recovering nicely in East General hospital, Ron is talking cheerfully about the day "I will solo."

Meanwhile, 15 of his friends have launched a massive neighborhood scrap collection with all the proceeds going into the big jar.

Already they have netted \$9 of the \$200 they need for the new leg.

## Clearing Ground For New Farm Exhibition Building

No sooner had the first sod been turned by Vice President and Manager J. H. Kennedy of the Provincial Exhibition Association when a giant bulldozer of the County Construction building began clearing the ground on the site of the new Agricultural Exhibition Building which will be the finest of its kind in Eastern Canada and an important asset to the agriculture industry in this Province.

The new building will be of concrete foundation, rising to a height of five to six feet above the general ground level and will be constructed entirely from steel including the walls and roof; the overall length and breadth is 225 x 150 feet. It will have a seating capacity of over 3,500.

The steel trusses which will support the roof will be carried on two rows of concrete pyramid buttresses running the length of the building at a distance of 120 feet apart. The show ring will enclose a space 180 x 90 feet. In the space under the seats there will be ample room for merchant's display booths. The directors of the Exhibition Association will, before the completion of the building, make an inspection of similar structures in the Maritimes with the view of including all the most important features and wherever possible making improvements.

The location of the building on the Exhibition grounds is on the area formerly used as a horse show ring. It will run in a north south direction at right angles to Kensington Road which is the northern boundary of the grounds.

Completion of the outside structure is expected by July 1st. It is hoped that the inside will be ready for this year's show in August.
