## Two In Running For Prince NDPs

Two persons have agreed to stand for nomination as New Democratic Party candidates for the federal seat in Prince County.

The party's provincial secretary - organizer, Tommy Dunphy, said yesterday that Douglas MacFarlane, Bedeque, and Gregory Macinnis, Tignish, will seek nomination at the party's Prince County convention in Summerside on March 5. Mr. Dunphy said that two other persons from the Summerside area are considering seeking the nomination.

Plans for the convention, at which T. G. Douglas, national leader of the party, will be speaker, are to be completed by the provincial executive at a meeting Wednesday night at party headquarters in Charlottetown.

The national secretary of the party, Carl Hamilton, will attend.

## Tignish Credit Union Plans 25th Anniversary In July

TIGNISH — Tignish Credit Union will celebrate its 25th anniversary on July 25. A gala celebration is planned and a feature attraction, the first time for the community, will be a good old fashioned chicken barbecue.

The Tignish Credit Union was organized in the spring of 1937, and received its charter on April 22 of that year. The first office was set up in the home of Fidele J. Arsenault with a membership of seven, and today boasts well over 1,000 members. The first president was Hubert Gaudet, M.L.A. and the first treasurer was Gerald Handrahan, manager of Tignish Co-op Ltd.

When the co-op store was built in 1940, the credit union was carried on there on a part-time basis by Mr. Handrahan. In 1946 Eileen Handrahan who worked in the co-op office took over the job of treasurer still on part-time basis until the fall of 1949 when the present offices were opened and Miss Laura Shea was hired as first full time treasurer, until 1953 when the position was taken over by Cletus Gavin.

During all these years business increased rapidly and to deal with the mounting business, it was necessary to hire an assistant treasurer and in January 1960, Miss Janie Keough was

## Leaking Fuel Oil Creates Problem Along N.S. Coast

THREE FATHOM HARBOR, N.S. (CP) — More than 100,000 gallons of fuel oil seeping slowly from the wreck of the Lebanese freighter Suerie here poses a threat to fishermen, bathing beaches and waterfront on a large section of Nova Scotia's Eastern Shore.

Representatives of the ship's owners and the federal transport department will meet Wednesday to decide on steps to prevent what could become a major local disaster.

The oil is of the type known commercially as bunker-C, so thick it is almost solid in cold weather. The 7,500-ton Suerie was carrying it as ballast when she grounded Jan. 8 on a reef near the entrance to Three Fathom Harbor, 15 miles east of Halifax.

The ship was abandoned by her crew next day. Salvage men said she is damaged too badly to be saved. Since then some oil has leaked out of the damaged hull but lower temperatures have kept the flow at a minimum.

WOULD CREATE MESS

E. O. Buchanan, Halifax supervisor of the transport department's steamship inspection division, said Monday that if the whole 100,000 gallons of oil leaks out it will create "an awful mess," damaging fishing gear, killing water birds and fish and fouling beaches for miles around.

He visited the area during the weekend with insurance underwriters and agents for the Suerie's managing owners, Transmarine Agencies Limited of London, Eng. Weather conditions prevented them from boarding the wreck. They plan to return to the ship early this week for a detailed inspection.

Alfred C. Huxtable, president of F. K. Warren Limited, the ship's Halifax agents, said a meeting with insurance and transport officials will be held Wednesday.

## Changes In Administration Made In 2 Gov't Departments

Changes in ministerial responsibility for two divisions of government departments were announced in the Legislature yesterday by Premier Walter R. Shaw.

He said that effective April 1, the division of town planning of the department of industry and natural resources will be transferred to the department of municipal affairs.

Another change is that the pasteurizing plant at Riverside Dairy will be administered by the department of health instead of the department of agriculture. This change has already been made; it was effective Feb. 1.

In answer to Opposition Leader Alex Matheson's question as to why the change in administration of the pasteurizing plant was made, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said it was felt that the department of health is better equipped to maintain sanitary control than the department of agriculture.

## Liberals Asking Government To Pay Hospital Insurance

Notice has been posted that a resolution, asking that the provincial government pay the cost of hospital insurance out of the general revenue of the province, will be introduced in the Legislature.

Mover of the resolution will be Dr. M.L. Bonnell, L-4th Kings; seconder will be G.J. Ferguson, L-5th Kings.

Reasons for the resolution, as stated in the preamble, are the present government seems to be unable to administer the hospital insurance premium plan to the satisfaction of the people of the province; the government has imposed a four per cent sales tax; the government has over a million dollar increase in revenue from the sale of liquor and the government has imposed a provincial income tax.

Notices have also been issued, giving the titles of 14 bills that will be considered by the House. Nine of the bills will be introduced by Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid; four by Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart, and one by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae.

Mr. McQuaid's bills are: An Act to Amend the County Court Act, An Act to Amend the Marriage Act, An Act to Temporarily Suspend the Operation of Certain Statutes and Parts of Statutes, An Act to Amend the Companies Tax Act, An Act to Amend the Coroners Act, An Act to Amend the Interpretation Act, a bill entitled the Variation of Trusts Act, An Act to Amend the Magistrates Act,

and an Act to Amend the Expropriation Act.

Bills to be introduced by Mr. Stewart are An Act to Amend the Town Planning Act, An Act to Amend the Village Services Act, An Act to Amend an Act Respecting Civil Defence and Disaster Within the Province of Prince Edward Island, and a bill entitled the Centennial Celebration Act.

Mr. MacRae will introduce a bill entitled An Act to Amend the Potato Production Act.
