Fifteen Prince Edward Island Boy Scouts left the province yesterday morning to attend the first British Columbia Jamboree to be held in Penitence, B.C. from July 9th to 16th. Scoutmaster for the Troop is Ewen Stewart of Charlottetown.

The Island Scouts will join 50 New Brunswick Scouts in Moncton and will travel by CNR with a stop-over in Ottawa and in Vancouver prior to the Jamboree. On their return journey, they plan to spend a day in Winnipeg, a day in Toronto with a
