U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, Feb. 4 — (AP) — Raw steel continued to pour from American mills in record-breaking amounts but finished steel production failed to keep pace last week. Steel magazine says today. For the third straight week, the metal-working journal reports, an all-time record for raw steel production was smashed. The mark now stands at the 2,025,000 net tons of ingots turned out last week when mills operated at 101.5 per cent of the United States' rated capacity of 104,229,650 tons annually. The old record set the week before was 2,000,000. Mills operated at 100 per cent of capacity then.
