Feeding Cane and Eggs.  
When an animal is fattened for a length of time, by being fed exclusively on fattening foods, the vitality of the animal will be lowered, hence it should be marketed as soon as ready. Excessive fat is of itself a disease, and when the food is lacking in nitrogen, lime and other essential substances, the result will be death if the carcass is allowed to fatten as continued.

The Poultry Yard.  
For sore throat or canker use equal parts sulphur, mace and powdered alum and blow down the throat with an insect powder gun.

For swelled heads baths with equal parts sulphate of zinc and tincture of nyrth.

About Sweet Corn.  
More sweet corn should be planted next spring. MEXICO'S WORLD'S FAIR.  
It Will Open Next September and Continue Open for Six Months.  
The great international exposition of industries and fine arts, authorized by the Federal Government of Mexico, by concession dated January 9, 1895, will be opened in the City of Mexico next September and will remain open for a period of six months. This will be Mexico's first attempt at holding a world's fair. The exposition is to include all kinds of industrial, scientific, commercial and artistic products, and to embrace, in fact, the whole range of human activity.  
The exposition grounds are situated at the foot of the historic Castle of Chapultepec, on the grand Avenue de la Reforma, within ten minutes' ride from the center of the City of Mexico, and comprise an area of about 600 acres. The exposition will comprise a national and an international department, to which will be invited all the nations of the globe to contribute.  
The City of Mexico is situated on an extraordinary plateau, occupying an area of over 170 square miles, surrounded by lofty mountains and including five lakes within its limits. Although, with a geographical location, the temperature is the latitude of the city being 19 degrees 50 minutes north, it is possessed of a climate so equable, so even a temperature, that summer or winter is a residence in Mexico, for the winters are always pleasant, and visits to the city can be made at any time of the year, whether it is to escape the extreme cold of the northern winters or the excessive heat of the northern summers. The climate, however, is not the only attraction, all visitors agreeing that the beauty of the environs, of the surrounding mountains and the beautiful lakes, in whose waters are reflected the snow-capped peaks of the great mountains, and the Popocatepetl, and further the many antiquities and strange sights to be seen, the fruits and flowers, both summer and winter, are far rivals of the greatest interest to the visitor.  
In natural resources, especially in metals and other minerals, Mexico is favored more than almost any other portion of the globe. She has endless and inexhaustible mines of nearly every metal of metallic, oxides and other valuable stones, which in themselves would insure wealth to millions. Thousands of tons of precious metals lie hidden beneath her soil. In agriculture and horticulture she has an amount of wealth almost as great as in minerals.  
After noticing the forward movement of the Mexican nation, it can be readily understood that the needs of the people are increasing proportionately to that a market of enormous value is being opened to the world. A few nations have already taken advantage of this fact, and are doing all in their power to secure the trade benefits which are to come to those who supply the demands. Canada produces much that Mexico requires, and should be able to bring about a greater exchange of products than at present obtains between the two countries.

A Famous Undertaker.  
Peter Relyea, who died in Brooklyn the other day, was one of the best known undertakers in the United States. He had charge of President Lincoln's funeral in New York, and never tired of telling about it, and especially the quick work he did at that time. On the morning of April 21, 1865, one of the New York Board of Aldermen engaged him. The funeral case was to be ready four days later. He hesitated unduly and erected a temporary workshop in the square at the junction of East Broadway and Grand street, and from that moment on worked unceasingly, and the car to be drawn by the sixteen horses was turned out on time. Sixty men and women were employed in the work, which cost the city about \$600. It took charge of the body at Jersey City on its arrival from Washington, and it remained in his charge while lying in state at the City Hall.
