

Chicago, Toronto In 2-All Tie; Canadiens Score 5-1 Win Over NY

TORONTO, Feb. 17 (CP)—The lowly Chicago Black Hawks, backed by Harry Lumley's spectacular goaltending, battled to a 2-2 tie with Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday night in a National Hockey League game before 12,869 fans.

But the hapless Hawks, doomed to stand up in last place in the league standings, got another chunk of the hard luck they've been taking in big doses. They lost Bill Gadsby, tops among their remaining four defencemen, for possibly two weeks. He received torn knee ligaments in the second period.

MONTREAL, Feb. 17 (CP)—The old and the new of Montreal Canadiens combined to fashion a winning amalgam Saturday night and turn back New York Rangers 5-1 in a National Hockey League game.

Victory, before 14,347 fans, pushed Canadiens into a second-place tie with Toronto. While Canadiens were defeating the Rangers, Leafs were playing to a 2-2 draw with Chicago Black Hawks.

The summary told graphically the manner in which Canadiens' youngsters and seasoned players combined for victory.

Young Dickie Moore marked up three goals for the Habits and Boom Boom Geoffrion scored two. Back of these efforts, though, was superlative ice craftsmanship by the veteran Elmer Lach and Little Red. Lach drew two assists and Reay one.

The two assists for Lach gave the veteran centre a new niche in the hockey records, because they meant that with 596 points scored in regular league games and Stanley Cup tilts he went two points ahead of the record of Bill Cowley of Boston.

R. C. A. F. Hoop Team Defeats P. W. C. 46-30

The Royal Canadian Air Force basketball team from Summerside tightened their grip on second place in the Prince Edward Island Basketball League Saturday night by defeating the Prince of Wales College quintet 46-30 at P. W. C.

The game was a low-scoring affair due partly to the erratic shooting of both teams and also the tight zone defense set up by the air force.

The Welshmen stayed with the airmen in the first half but faded in the last twenty minutes. At the end of the first half the score was 22-19 in favor of the Air Force.

The outcome was settled in the third quarter as the R. C. A. F., led by Captain Green, Andy Andrews and Scotty Jennings, broke through to score 14 points while holding their opponents to half that number.

Andrews was high point getter for the airmen with six field goals, good for 12 points. Terry Boon was runner-up with seven, followed by Green with six.

Big John MacNaught, rangey P. W. C. guard, led the Welshmen with 10 points on five field goals. Coach Earl Nicholson, playing his first league game this season, scored eight points and Tommy Scantlebury came through with six.

The Welshmen went into a 1-0 lead on Tommy Scantlebury's free throw and this proved to be the only point scored for three minutes. At the seven minute mark the collegians were leading 6-4 but at the end of the first quarter the airmen were ahead 8-6. Scantlebury scored five points in the first ten minutes and Andrews four.

Andrews and Max Embrett led the airmen in the second quarter with each player scoring four points. Coach Nicholson was P. W. C.'s most dangerous man with two baskets.

Green and Jennings each fired two field goals in the third quarter to lead their team head. The P. W. C. scoring was done by MacNaught, MacKinnon and Nicholson with one basket each. Score at the end of the third quarter was 37-23 for the visitors.

Play tightened up in the last quarter with the airmen outscoring the collegians by nine points. MacNaught was high man for P. W. C. with Boon being high for the air force.

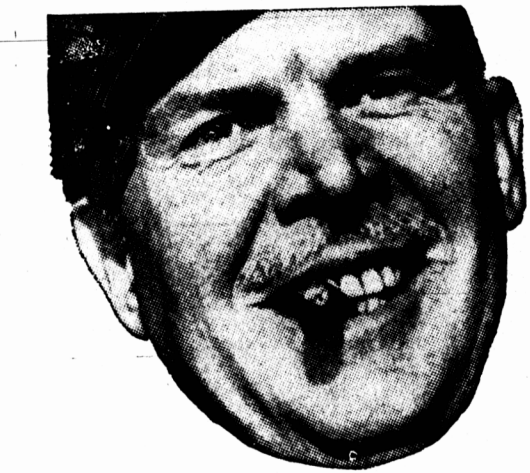
