OTTAWA (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders on Tuesday announced that they had reorganized their front office this week amid persistent reports that general manager George Terlep is to be fired.

# Jackson's First Can. QB to Receive All-Star Rating

TORONTO (CP)—Russ Jackson, a 25-year-old high school teacher who turned down an opportunity to become a libral Scholar so he could play professional football, was named Monday as the Eastern Football Conference's all-star quarterback—the first time in 16 years a Canadian has been picked for the job.

The choice of Ottawa Rough Riders' brilliant exponent of the run-pass option play for the key quarterback spot and the unusual selection of offensive half-back George Dixon of Montreal Alouettes and defensive half-back Don Sutherland of Hamilton Tiger-Cats highlighted the voting for the 1962 Canadian Press EFC all-star teams.

Ballooting for the offensive and defensive teams was conducted for CP by members of the Football Reporters of Canada in the

four league cities. The 31 selectors turned to the offensive power of the league-leading Tiger-Cats for the backbone of the offensive team and to the standard defence of the runer-up Rough Riders for the bulk of the defensive squad.

The voters, whose ballots were weighted to give equal strength to each league city, picked six Hamilton players for the offensive line and three on defence and the last-place Alouettes were chosen for two positions on offence and three on defence. The last-place Toronto Argonauts picked one offensive half and two on the defensive team.

# France's Match II Wins International

LAUREL, Me. (AP)—Match II of France came near the end of the pack in the stretch Monday to catch Kelso and Carry Back of the United States and win the 11th running of the \$125,000 Washington D.C. International.

The four-year-old brown colt owned by Francis Dupre beat the two American stars by more than a length in the 1 1/2-mile race before 32,800 at Laurel Race Course.

The victory was the third by a French horse in the global contest.

Canada's entry, Lebon ML owned by Max Bell of Calgary, was far off the pace, finishing 12th in the 1 1/2-mile race.

Kelso, the five-year-old gelding who was Horse of the Year

in the U.S. in 1960 and 1961, led the end of the pack in the stretch Monday to catch Kelso and Carry Back of the United States and win the 11th running of the \$125,000 Washington D.C. International.

Match II ran the 1 1/2 miles in two minutes 28 1/2 seconds, two seconds slower than the track record set last year by T. V. Lark.

Match II returned \$14,200, \$6 and \$4 for a \$2 bet. Kelso paid \$4 and \$3.20 while Carry Back was \$4.80 for three.

Russia's Zaber was fourth in the field of 13 starters from nine nations.

The first prize money for Match II was \$70,000.

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
