### IMMIGRATION.

One of the most significant movements of modern times has been the great exodus of people from crowded Europe to America. Within the past century more than twenty millions of people from Europe made their homes in the United States alone. For some years past the number of immigrants landed in the great Republic has been more than a million a year and the total from the beginning of the movement exceeds twenty-five millions. Other millions have come to Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Argentina in comparatively recent years. These immigrants and the natural increase of them and their descendants make up the bulk of the population of the New World.

And the tide is increasing in volume. Canada received last year between 200,000 and 250,000 immigrant settlers and the estimate for the current year is over 300,000. On only five different years before the Dominion was formed did the United States receive so many, and in only one year before 1870 was the immigration to that country in excess of 400,000. Canada is now receiving ten times as many immigrants as the United States was receiving when that nation was forty years old. And while now our population is to that of the United States as 1 to 14 we are receiving one fourth part as many immigrants as our southern competitor and generally of a better class.

That is the brighter side of the picture. The other side is the big expenditure involved, which this year will be close upon a million dollars, and this coupled with the fact that the Provinces east of the Great Lakes will receive very little addition to their population and the Maritime Provinces practically none. This ought in some way to be equalised, or some countervailing advantages should be extended to the eastern section of Canada in another way. But all true Canadians will be gratified to find that the Dominion as a whole is now enjoying a more rapid growth in population than ever before and that it will probably continue for years to come.

It is reasonably clear that the Dominion has only touched the fringe of its mineral development. What stores of coal, iron, gold, silver, petroleum, natural gas and other valuable underground resources are yet to be discovered in the settled and vast unsettled and unexplored territories of Canada, can only be dimly imagined. Some of the richest finds have been in recent years—as in the Yukon and Cobalt, Ont. and yet our mineral product have already reached a value of almost \$75,000,000 a year; or over \$50 per family on an average. These are big figures.

Referring to the question of free delivery of letters by the carrier system some business men say that they prefer to get their letters in their boxes or at the general delivery as soon as they are sorted. The carrier system would in no way interfere with that privilege. As a matter of fact in every Canadian city that has free delivery a number of persons take delivery of their mails at the post office. But the great mass of the people are served at their own doors, and they count upon this as one of the real modern luxuries of civilisation. The postman's knock at the door is always a welcome sound.

### PROHIBITION AND LICENSE.

A gratifying feature in connection with the Prohibitory Law is that it now stands approved heartily by many who at its advent were doubtful of any good results from its enactment. It is today supported by pulp and press as heartily as any good law on the statute book. Best of all it is well approved by the fact that it has greatly contributed to the sobriety and welfare of the community. The Patriot of Saturday quoted some striking statistics. In 1877 under the license system the arrests for drunkenness in Charlottetown were 737; in 1906 under Prohibition the arrests were 106, or barely one sixth of as many as in license days.

It is also to be borne in mind that the 106 delinquents of last year really represent but a comparatively small number of individuals who were arrested over and over again. And these are in many cases relics of the unrestricted traffic of other days, men who formed a habit which has proved a mortgage upon their lives and who still must needs drink to sobriety whenever they can get it. It is also to be noted that the population of the city is considerably larger than it was in 1877. What good citizen would be willing to go back to the license days at the cost of multiplying drunkenness sevenfold? To ask this question is to answer it. Prohibition is abundantly justified by its fruits and the fact is known and read of all intelligent citizens who know the facts.

If we had our rights all passengers would be carried across the Straits, when the steamers are not running, either for nothing or 25 cents—the current rate of three cents a mile. The charge of \$2.50 for "strap passengers" and \$5 for those who are conveyed across, is an outrage. Some one should inquire in Parliament why these rates have been raised from \$2 and \$4 as they formerly were and also demand the reduction to a reasonable rate. We may add that The Guardian did not coin the phrase "strap passengers" as has been supposed. It is officially used in the report of the Marine Department. Passengers to and from the Island are singled out from among all others who travel in Canada to bear this insulting name, and the degrading servitude which it carries with it.

In the aftermath of discussion on the Manitoba election, it is declared by the Manitoba Free Press that Archbishop Langevin threw the entire weight of the Catholic Church organisation into the scales in support of Premier Roblin. And the Orange Sentinel, Toronto, declares that the influence of the R. C. Church was thrown into the scales against Roblin. In like manner it is contended by opposing



Journals that the influence of the liquor trade was for Roblin and against Roblin. It is probably pretty safe to say that Roblin won because he had a majority of the electors in his favor. The people count for something yet, even in elections.
