Alan Stewart Addresses Electors Of First Queens

Ladies and Gentlemen, free and independent electors of the grand old district of First Queens; the fairest, most enterprising place in the whole wide world; the district where the skies are the bluest (when the sun shines) and where sea and farm products grade higher and taste better than anywhere else —

First Queens is the largest district on the Island, with upwards of 3,000 eligible voters and 3023 miles of roads, where practically all of us earn our living by fishing or farming, or by combining both occupations.

You have done me the honour of electing me to represent your district for nearly 30 years, and I have done my best to further your interests and the interests of our Province as a whole. For two four-year periods I have been your only representative on the government side of the House. Due to the largeness of this district I have not been able to visit you personally as often as I would wish, for if one meets with even two persons per day, it would take over 300 days to meet all the electors.

CHANGED TIMES

During the 30 years since I was first elected to represent you there have been great changes in our standard of living, and a great increase in what we expect Governments to do for us. Farm work has been greatly mechanized; money invested in Farm Machinery is in many instances greater than the value of the land cultivated. Governments have become more paternal — 30 years ago we had no Old Age Pensions, No Family Allowances, No Widows Allowances. We had no T. B. Sanatorium and our death rate from Tuberculosis was the highest in Canada.

Our Infirmary was very inadequate, and only housed the really destitute. We doled out 10 dollars per year to those we did not have room for in the institution.

The Department of Agriculture consisted of a Commissioner and a Secretary. Our poultry flocks were ridden with Airan T. B. and chickens died in thousands of various infections diseased. Animal health was attended to by a few practising veterinarians.

There was no Department of Industry or Marketing, and no Tourist Bureau. The Department of Public Works was just becoming road-conscious. There was no Power Machinery, and roads were supposed to be kept in repair by a system of Statute Labor, helped out by a few horse-drawn graders. There were no paved roads, and no snow plows.

THE OPPOSITION

In listening to the opposition addresses both in the Legislature and on the Radio, I have been impressed by their lack of consistency. On the one hand they criticize the Liberal Government for their niggardly expenditure in all their departments then turn around and condemn them for increasing the expenditure in those same departments.

Now Ladies and Gentlemen, while a great deal has been accomplished, there still remains much to be done. We have miles of dirt roads that should be widened and ditched. The Rural Electrification programme has been only one year in operation, and the assistance to processing plants is just getting underway.

The Department of Agriculture is taking more interest in the ordinary dirt farmer. The Department of Health & Welfare has a large programme still to be accomplished; and we would ask our long-suffering and patient electors not to expect this all to be finished in one season.

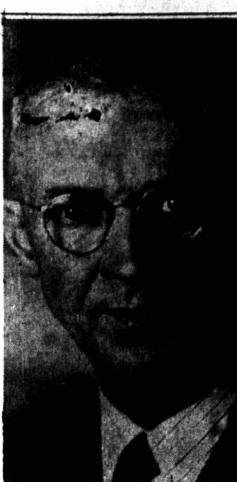
BATTLE CRIES

If there was nothing left over for a future date, your representatives might as well resign. I do not know how Slogans or Battle Cries originated. They have been used since ancient times to incite and encourage the friendly and to strike terror to the hearts and minds of enemy combatants during the heat of battle. We know the Spartans used these devices at the Battle of Thermopylae; our Saxon forefathers shouted "out Out!" when they fought the Normans on the blood-stained sod of Senlac-Hill. In not so distant times we find the Scottish Highland Clans crying their Slogans when Dirk and Claymore rang on brass-studded targets; and the war-pipes wailed out the pibroch amid the din of fight.

The slogan of the Liberal Party has always been "Equal opportunity for all, special privileges for none."

Our Conservative friends have had almost as many slogans as they had names for their party. During the Reciprocity Election of 1911, the slogan of the Liberal-Conservative party as they then called themselves, was "No trick or trade with the yankees". They won that contest and the hands of the clock were set back 30 years.

In the Dominion Election of 1930, the "National Conservatives" as they then called themselves, used the slogan "We will blast our way into the Markets of the

World." They were again elected; and they blasted with such vigor, we lost whatever foreign markets we had. Their slogan during this Campaign seems to be "It is time for a change".

NO LACK OF CHANGE

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, during this time I have represented you, we have had five different premiers: Saunders, Lea, Campbell, Jones and Matheson and the personnel of Governments has changed many times, so there has been no lack of change.

The Matheson Government is now asking for your support, why should we exchange it for inexperienced candidates whose only thought seems to be "It's time for a change".

I would not care to see any of you in the position of the man who had gotten himself securely fastened in a box. There was only a small knot-hole through which he was unable to get out. Election day came round and he wanted to vote. The returning Officer stretched the rules of Procedure a bit and a ballot was passed in to him. He marked it for the Conservative party, and when the elector's return came in he felt so small he crawled out through the knot-hole!

The Matheson Government has made a lot of Progress — in the extension of Rural Electrification; in assistance to Farmers and Fishermen; encouraging the erection of plants; improving many of our dirt-roads; extending our permanent pavements; by greatly increasing our Health programme; finding markets for our products, and in many other ways. Alex Matheson's Party is going to be returned. If you want continuation of good sufficient Government — vote for the Liberal Candidates, Frederic Large and Alan Stewart.
