Doctors Suggest Bilingualism Medical Degree Requirement

By CY FOX MONTREAL (CP) — Representatives of 6,000 French-speaking physicians suggested here that knowledge of both French and English should be required of students seeking a medical degree.

The doctors told the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism. It is vitally important that we in the medical profession understand one another. Otherwise harm might be done the human beings under our care.

The spokesmen heard by the commission on the second of its three days of public sittings here came from L'Association des Medecins de Langue Francaise du Canada.

One of their number, Dr. Albert Jurias, said there is "very extensive and close contact" between English and French-speaking doctors in Canada.

But doctors of French background lack textbooks in their own language and must depend on texts from the United States, though Dr. Jurias said these are more popular with his colleagues than the only French books available now — which come from France.

BOOKS CHIEF TOPIC Books were a major subject of discussion by others among the 11 delegations that confronted the 10-member commission before an audience more plentiful than Monday's but still amounting to less than 100.

Among spokesmen with different subjects to raise were a 17-year-old boy, wearing a maple-leaf brooch, argued for a Canadian republic within the British Empire; a brigade of

BOND MARKET BY THE CANADIAN PRESS Prices on the Canadian bond market continued to move higher this week, despite moderate trading.

Activity on the short-term Canada, provincial and municipal markets was sparked by new issues.

Favorite was the 34-per-cent Oct. 1, 1967, bond announced last Friday by Finance Minister Walter L. Gordon. The bond sold well, opening the week's trade at 98.55, and closing at 98.60 bid to 98.70 asked.

A new province of Ontario bond ran a close second to the federal issue in popularity. The bond, 34-per-cent due April 15, 1965, was introduced at 99, and finished the week at 99 bid to 99.25 asked.

Interest on the municipal market centred around a Place des Arts, Montreal, \$20,000,000 40-year debenture. The issue is split: \$1,800,000 is offered at 5 1/2 per cent, \$18,200,000 at 5 1/4 per cent.

Long-term issues followed the trend toward higher prices. The 5-per-cent issue of 1973 was quoted at 100 bid to 100.25 asked.

Only quotes to drop were treasury bills. Thursday's bill tender showed 91-day bills at 3.70 per cent and 182-day bills at 3.92 per cent. The 91-day bills fell as low as 3.65 per cent in after-market trade.

Day-to-day money, unchanged at 3 1/2 per cent, increased to \$178,000,000 from \$143,000,000.

Steel Output Shows Increase

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian steel ingot production totalled 745,649 tons in February compared with 701,449 a year earlier for an increase of 6.3 per cent, the bureau of statistics reported Friday.

Production for the first two months this year was 1,564,123 tons against 1,407,273 in the corresponding 1964 period.

Pig iron production in February showed only a slight gain over last year—\$13,910 tons against 510,240. The January-February figures are 1,115,386 tons this year, 1,031,286 in 1964.

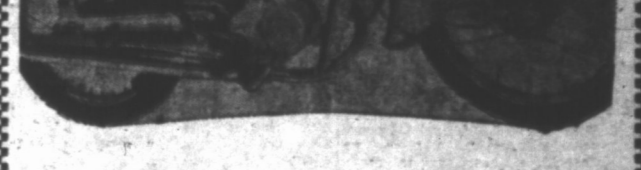
