

Johanssen-Folley Match Is Suggestion Of N.B.A.

MILWAUKEE (CP)—The National Boxing Association Friday suggested a bout between Ingemar Johanssen of Sweden and Tony Folley of Chandler, Ariz., to kick a "rightful and undisputed" contender for the world heavyweight title.

Johanssen, who recently knocked out another heavyweight contender, Eddie Machen of the U.S., in one round, was proclaimed by the NBA as the No. 1 challenger behind Folley for Floyd Patterson's crown. The unbeaten Swedish puncher, rated sixth last month, also was designated as the NBA's fighter of the month.

Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Jean, N.B., who will fight champion Archie Moore for the world light-heavyweight crown in December, retained his No. 3 spot in the NBA ratings, behind Harold Johnson and Tony Anthony.

OUTSTANDING PROSPECT

The NBA named George Chuvalo of Toronto among young boxers with outstanding prospects.

Fred Saddy, chairman of the NBA rating committee, said that Johanssen-Folley bout, in addition to picking a logical challenger, would create interest in the heavyweight division.

New leading contenders were picked by the NBA in two divisions as a result of upsets in September.

Vince Martinez was ranked as the new No. 1 welterweight behind champion Virgil Akins as the result of Gaspar Ortega's surprising defeat at the hands of lightweight Don Jordan. Kenny
