THE STANLEY.—The Stanley left Pictou at seven o'clock this morning and reached Georgetown shortly before eleven. She had quite a number of passengers on board. No ice is reported between Pictou and Georgetown. She will sail on return to Pictou at the usual hour to-morrow morning.

MURDER WILL OUT.—A Kingston, Ont., despatch says that by the death of the last of three men, and on his confession, publicity is given to the murder of a boy in the woods near Calabogie, thirty years ago. The boy was injured by the falling of a tree, and to end his sufferings each of the men struck him once with an axe.

PAINTING UP.—Mr. John Gaffney is busily engaged painting and beautifying the interior of the Old Bank building, into which the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island intend moving in May next. He has also workmen engaged upon the interior of the Rankin House building, which Mr. Simon Bolger intends occupying early in May next.

A PLEASANT AFFAIR.—The Halifax Mail says the "At Home" on board the steamer Halifax on Tuesday evening was a pleasant event. The ship was thoroughly inspected, and a luncheon enjoyed. Speeches were made in all of which the enterprise of the new company was referred to. A sister ship to the Halifax will be added to the line in the near future.

BOARD OF HEALTH.—At the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon, the Health Officer was instructed to examine the premises at the east end of the city in which scarlet fever of a malignant type is alleged to exist, and to report the results of said examination as soon as possible to the chairman of the Board. The matter of the vaccination of children will be taken up at the next meeting of council.

A MISER'S MONEY.—The Fredericton, N. B., Gleaner says that Henry Kerr, an old resident of Nashwaak, died about a month ago, and the death of his aged widow occurred last week. Just before the death of the latter she told her two children—a grown up son and daughter—that after her death they would find over \$1,000 in gold hidden away in the cellar. The other day the two began the search for the money, and after some time found it in a small recess in the stone wall.

THE RING.—The St. John Sun says that Billy Gallagher has accepted the challenge of John Goskill, and is to meet the latter at Charles Spiller's next Monday evening to sign articles. Gallagher is well known in Charlottetown.

Peter Jackson has posted a forfeit of \$500, and has challenged any man in the world to fight him to a finish for \$3,000 a side. It won't do to draw the color line on this audacious dandy. Who will be the first in the East to ignore it and prove to him that the Caucasian is the "superior race," physically as well as mentally?

THE STANLEY'S GOOD WORK.—The Pictou correspondent of the Halifax Herald writes: The steamer Stanley left Georgetown at six o'clock on Monday morning for Pictou, after having laid up one week to clean boilers. She encountered very heavy ice all the way, but just north of Pictou Island was met by a jam of great depth and was detained by it from Monday afternoon until seven Tuesday morning. The passengers who came by her are loud in their praise of the steamer's performance. She cut through ice which was for long distances, three to three and a half feet thick, with the greatest ease. They say the Islanders are now nearer the much desired "continuous communication" than they think. They also say this trip has demonstrated that when the vessel gets into difficulty she has power sufficient to work her way out of it—that she simply did wonders.

TWAS A FAILURE.—Ten days ago, Frank Sloan, of Sidney, Ohio, drew \$9,500 from the bank, to pay for a recently purchased farm. His son Horace stole the money the same day, and skipped to Montreal, where he made the acquaintance of a member of the demi-monde, proposed, was accepted, and the couple got married and left for Denver, Colorado, to go into the ranching business. Detective Kellert had however, kept the track of the guilty pair and informed Sloan, senior, when his son and new daughter-in-law might be expected there. At the hour indicated, the old man boarded the Chicago express, and stood face to face with the runaway boy. A reconciliation followed; \$9,000 of the stolen money was returned, and the son went home with the father, and the woman to Chicago to shift for herself.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Who Fired the Shots?

A Sentry Badly Wounded

While on Guard at Richmond.

An Investigation Being Held.

HALIFAX, March 7.

Private Boyford, of the West Riding Regiment, while on guard at the magazine at Richmond last night, about 11.30, says a man approached the magazine through an opening in the fence, that he challenged him, and the man giving no reply he (the soldier) walked up to the intruder, and when close to him the man fired a revolver at his head at close quarters. He put up his hand and received a bullet through the fingers. The man then ran through the hole by which he entered. The sentry followed and while he was getting through the fence the man again fired at him from the railway and blew his cap off. The man then ran up the railway track, the soldier following and firing three shots after him. The rest of the guard having turned out the wounded man was taken to the Military Hospital. His finger was found to be so shattered that it had to be amputated close to the palm. Three empty military cartridges, and a soldier's cape partly burned were found on the railway track which goes to corroborate the man's statement. A court of inquiry composed of officers of the regiment and the doctors of the Hospital are investigating the case.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 7.

The amendments made by the Senate to the bill amending the Weights and Measures Act were considered in committee and concurred in.

The bill making further provisions respecting the speedy trial of certain indictable offences was considered in committee and agreed to.

The budget debate was then resumed by Hon. C. H. Tupper, followed by Mr. Carlton and Mr. White, of Renfrew.

At 12.20 Mr. Armstrong moved the adjournment of the debate and the House then rose.

NOTES.

In the Senate, this evening, Hon. Mr. Macdonald, of Toronto, brought up the question of trade with the West Indies. He deprecated the idea of making trade arrangements with the Australasian Colonies, distance being against it, and he hoped energetic efforts would be put forth to develop trade with the West Indies. He contended that a first-class line must be subsidized, the steamers to be not less than two thousand tons, and capable of steaming fifteen knots an hour. He urged the Government to endeavor to secure improved cable communication with the West Indies. It is understood that the Ontario Legislature will be dissolved after this session.

The Government has decided not to make a grant for a Dominion Exhibition this year, and has, therefore, been compelled to refuse P. E. Island's application for \$3,000.

New Warships to be Built.

LONDON, March 7.

In the House of Commons Lord George Hamilton, First Lord of the Admiralty, stated that the delay in supplying the navy with guns is due to the failure of the system of lining all ships. He said they would be supplied by the end of the present year. He stated that the Government proposed to build eight first-class men-of-war of 14,000 tons each and two of 9,000 tons, nine first-class cruisers, twenty-nine smaller cruisers, four of the Pandora type of cruisers, and eighteen of the sharp-shooter type of torpedo vessels, at a total cost of £21,500,000.

King Milan's Abdication.

LONDON, March 7.

The abdication of King Milan will create considerable uneasiness on the continent, chiefly because M. Ristic, who is left in charge, has no majority back of him, either in the Skupschina or the country, and has intrigued equally with Russia and Austria. The Vienna correspondent of the Times says: "The Austrian Cabinet has been thrown into a state of consternation by Milan's abdication, fearing that it will result in Russian ascendancy. Milan goes to the Riviera. His private debts amount to 3,000,000 florins."

An Important Decision.

OTTAWA, March 7.

One of the most important decisions ever recorded in Canada has just been given by Deputy Commissioner of Patents, quashing the patent on the Edison Incandescent Lamp on the ground of failure to comply with Canadian patent regulations, which provide that the article patented must be manufactured in Canada within one year from the issue of the patent, and that the importation of the same patent must cease within two years. The decision entails a loss of thousands of dollars to the Edison Co., who have a lamp factory at Hamilton.

Man-of-War Wrecked.

LONDON, March 7.

The British man-of-war Sultan has been wrecked on the island of Comino, in the Mediterranean. The captain and crew were saved. The Sultan was an iron armor-plated vessel of 9,220 tons, and carried 19 guns. She was temporarily attached to the Mediterranean squadron.

The Regents Proclamation

BELGRADE, March 7.

The Regent of Servia has issued a proclamation declaring his endeavor to cultivate friendly relations with all the powers to inaugurate a constitutional regime and place the finances of the country upon a sound basis.
