Alberton Regals Whip G'town 10-6 To Capture Island Title

Alberton Regals, a hard driving band of western puck-chasers, won the MAHA Island Intermediate "B" title at Georgetown on Saturday night as they followed up their 15-1 victory on home ice with a 10-6 win over the Georgetown Eagles before a capacity house.

The game was fast throughout, and only three penalties were handed out. The winners played a brand of hockey that kept their forwards continually on the puck and disorganized the Eagles at attack. The Eagles chief weakness was their inability to clear the puck from their own zone.

The opening period ended 3-1 for

Georgetown on goals by Publicover, MacNeill and Stevens, with J. Baglow scoring for Alberton. In the second frame, the visitors put on tremendous pressure and outscored the locals 6-1 on goals by Gaudet, Fraser, MacDonald, Baglow, Stewart and LeClair. G. Murphy sank the lone Georgetown marker. In the final session Baglow, LeClair, and A. Richard found the mark for the winners, and MacSwin and MacNeill for the losers.

Undeclared In Two-Day 'Spiel

A powerhouse curling rink from Kings College of Halifax won its third consecutive Maritime Inter-Collegiate curling crown and the Canada Permanent Trust Shield at the Charlottetown Club on Saturday winning its last two matches to go through the two-day meet undefeated registering five victories.

The Prince of Wales Rink, who were tied for the top spot after the first day, lost both of Saturday's tussles and had to settle for third place.

St. Mary's of Halifax took the runner-up position winning both of Saturday's rounds to finish the tournament with four wins against one loss. P.W.C. had three wins and two losses.

Mount A. was fourth with a 2-3 record and Dalhousie fifth winning one and losing four. U.N.B. went winless throughout.

ends Winters was leading Filmore 8-3 but Dalhousie scored one in the eighth and two more in the ninth to make the score 8-6. The tenth end of this match saw what was perhaps some of the best curling of the meet. But the accurate curling of Dalhousie and the astute leadership given by Filmore were matched by that of Kings and Winters so that Filmore could count only one to lose the round 8-7.

Eleven Rinks Entered

Can. Curling Ch'ships To Begin At Moncton Today

MONCTON (CP)—The Canadian curling championship opens here today with 11 rinks representing every province and Northern Ontario taking part in the week-long round-robin bonspiel.

Northern Ontario drew the bye in this afternoon's first round and Saskatchewan takes on the host Beaver club, Manitoba and Alberta meet Quebec and Ontario and British Columbia plays Newfoundland. The western rinks arrived Saturday by train and were met by rinks from the Atlantic provinces.

The general consensus is that this year's championship will provide the closest competition in the 27-year history of the event.

Saskatchewan is the defending title but last year's Campbell Brothers' rink was eliminated by

Jimmy Hill and his Delisle foursome in the provincial playdowns. The emphasis seems to be on youth. Alberta's Matt Baldwin at 30 is the youngest skip. New Brunswick's Ralph Lister and Ontario's Alfie Phillips are the oldest skips at 48.

Gerry Glinz, Nova Scotia, Bill Walsh of Manitoba and Bob Goudy Newfoundland, all are 39. Walter Smith of Quebec is 33, Jim Hill, Saskatchewan, 37, Dr. W. L. MacDonald of Prince Edward Island, 43 and Steve Kuzmaki, Northern Ontario, is 44.

WESTERNERS YOUNGEST

The youngest curlers here are Hal Worth, Saskatchewan's third and their lead Donnie Morris, both 25. The second stone on the Saskatchewan rink, Al McNevin, is only 29, making Saskatchewan the

youngest rink.

Nova Scotia's Avar (Bert) Mann at 62 is the oldest in age. He has only been curling nine years but this will be his third shot at a Canadian title.

The Moncton stadium has five lanes of pebbled curling ice and the building bedecked with flags, bunting and a fresh coat of paint. All rinks limbered up on the ice at the Beaver or Moncton clubs Sunday against teams composed of local members.

Two rounds will be played Tuesday, in the morning and afternoon. A reception and banquet are scheduled Tuesday night. Wednesday matches are in the afternoon and evening. Thursday three rounds are on tap, and Friday two with Friday night reserved in case of a tie.
