FIGHTING IN THE PHILIPPINES

Americans Have Captured Malabou

AMERICAN TROOPS BEHAVED SPLENDIDLY UNDER FIRE

They Are Now Threatening the Insurgents Position.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Law news to the Government from General Otis announces that the Filipinos have evacuated Malabou and that efforts to prevent them effecting a junction at Malolos failed after heavy fighting.

The behavior of the troops was splendid under the ordeal of heat, fighting and marching.

The head of the column is fifteen miles from Malolos where the flower of the insurgent army is strongly entrenched, probably numbering twenty thousand men. The advance of troops is steadily resisted.

McArthur will resume the advance today supported by the cavalry and artillery.

Hard hand to hand fighting is expected tonight, Monday and tomorrow morning.

MANILA, March 26.—The Americans today took the town of Malinta after a sharp fight in which Colonel Egbert of the 22nd infantry and several others were killed.

Manila Prince Loewenstein, formerly honorary Aide-de-Camp on the staff of General Miller, at Iloilo, somehow got in front of the firing line and was killed.

Our casualties today are much lighter than yesterday.

The total reported since the engagement began is 45 dead and 145 injured.

MANILA, March 27.—The Filipinos are burning their stronghold at Malabou and their forces are fleeing from the city in the direction of Nichols, general McArthur's division is pushing forward to Malabou.

The insurgents will make a last stand probably at Malolos.

Washington, Colonel Egbert killed at Manila was wounded at Santiago but recovered and went to Manila.

Prince Ludwig Kerl, who was killed at Manila was the missing husband of Lady Anna Saville.

DIED, AGED 102.

Brothers and Sisters Pass the Centenary Mark.

CORNWALL, Ont., March 25.—One of the few centenarians of Eastern Ontario, Mrs. Catharine Barkley, died at the home of her son-in-law, aged 102 years. Her father, the late John Strader, was a U. E. Loyalist, who settled in the second concession of Matilda in 1785. Mrs. Barkley was born there in May in 1797. Four score years ago she married the late Joseph Barkley. Of a family of 12 children nine are still living. The family record for longevity is very remarkable. Mrs. Barkley's father and mother lie in a church yard near Iroquois, their recorded ages being 88 and 89 respectively. Her brother the late Captain John Strader had passed the centenary mark when he died, in 1888. Another brother, Henry Strader, of Brantford's Corners, died a couple of years earlier, aged 96, and a sister, the widow of the late Wm. Shaver, of Winchester, is her senior by three years and is still living.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Mail and Empire: Sir Wilfrid is angry because the blunders and deceptions are being explained by his opponents and understood by the people, and he feels that he is losing his grip.

Montreal Gazette: Mr. Greenway, of Manitoba, has also declared himself in favor of clipping the wings of the Senate. The Senate last session prevented Mr. Greenway from laying his political hands on \$300,000 of the Manitoba school trust fund. His voice is calculated to be about as effective on public opinion as a resolution of the Drummond County Railway vendors or a growl from Messrs. Mackenzie and Mann.

Dominion Grocer: The duty of Canadians is to mind their own business; to get into Parliament as many men of business common sense, irrespective of political faith, as possible, to the exclusion of those who are poor in the opposite quality; to devote their energies to developing our great natural resources, and to the development of our export trade with Great Britain in particular, and with countries in general whose tariffs are not specially designed to shut out Canadian products. These things do not mean retaliation; they do mean dependence upon our own energies.

Chinese Questions.

LONDON, March 25.—The Vienna correspondent of the Times, discussing Chinese questions, says: "Little love is lost between Japan and the United States. Certainly Japan is not anxious to see the Americans obtain a footing in China, particularly on account of America's protectionist policies."

ROME, March 25.—It is understood that the Chinese Minister has informed the Italian Government that China absolutely refuses the demand of Italy for a concession at San Moon Bay.

THAT CONFLICTING JUDGMENT.

SIR.—The judgment of the higher court reversing Mr. Justice Hodgson's decision in the Middle Gallant election case is mystifying to the ordinary layman, and might be passed over as simply a legal barlesque if it were not pregnant with such lamentable results as the engendering of contempt against recognized authority. When a gentleman of the well-known legal acumen and recognized sound judgment of Judge Hodgson renders a decision, the general public have, heretofore, been willing to accord it a respectful assent; and I cheerfully subscribe to the list of those who array themselves among that number.

Without, however offering any discordant note to the righteousness of the judgment delivered by the majority on the 21st inst., I feel like asking "Where are we at?" As an elector of the First District of Prince George's the scene of this election orgie—I blush that the state of affairs revealed by the election court should exist in our midst. But the facts of its unfortunate existence are undisputed, and the punishment one learned justice metes out is mitigated by a duct of colleagues until it becomes practically no punishment at all.

I am far from impugning the justice of the conclusions arrived at by Judges Sullivan and Fitzgerald, and must acknowledge a sense of a fey in the fact that we have our Courts of Appeal under the British system of legal jurisprudence. But when a judicial gentleman renders a decision one week, which commends itself to the reasonable men on the ground of both sides, an addendum, begotten of a sense of justice, is given; and when that decision is reversed by judicial conferees of no higher legal or judicial attainments, a few weeks later, you must pardon the layman's bewilderment.

I am far from wishing to, in any way, encourage the disrespect for judicial decisions, or whisperings of personal conflict between judges, which I hear everywhere around me. Nobody would feel more pained than I, sir, to know that such allegations had even the semblance of truth. I take the liberty, though, on the strength of the Gallant case, which I personally know was far from immaculate, to urge upon the authorities to make the law so that the subterfuge of a loan on election day will be more easily interpreted as a bribe, thereby silencing the anarchist contempt for all law which is the result, among the masses, of recent election decisions.

A Hundred Men Killed.

ALGERS, March 25.—Telegrams Algierian announce that a number of Arabs arrived at Ghardeia a few days ago and that they were raiding the country. Ghardeia is situated about 300 miles south of Algiers, in the Sahara.

It is further announced that a party of Touaregs recently attacked a European expedition which was on its way to Air, in the Sahara, and that after a fierce fight the Touaregs were beaten off, but the expedition lost one hundred killed, and part of its caravan captured.
