

Cape Bretoners Inquire What The Future Holds For Dosco

SYDNEY (CP)—The president of A. V. Roe (Canada) Limited has been asked to tell 130,000 Cape Bretoners what the future holds for the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation.

Cape Breton County Warden M. T. Sullivan released the text of a telegram sent Wednesday to Crawford Gordon, Jr., on behalf of the county and communities of Sydney, Glace Bay, New Waterford, Sydney Mines, Louis Sydney, Dominion and Louisbourg.

Roe last year acquired control of Dosco, the largest industrial employer in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Sullivan's telegram dealt with a decision to shut down Dominion Coal Company mines for 25 days during the summer months and "a sharp cutback in steel in which 840 or so men have been released from their jobs" at the Dominion Iron and Steel Limited plant here. Both companies are Dosco subsidiaries.

"Some 7,270 men have been registered with the unemployment insurance offices as a result of the forced mine closures," the telegram said. It asked for a guarantee that the idle period would be limited to five weeks and steel production would be maintained and increased.

FACT-FINDING STATEMENT
"... I ask for your assurance that a fact-finding statement will be made," Mr. Sullivan said. "An A. V. Roe declaration of policy is desirable. But all we ask are the facts, a straight-from-the-shoulder statement..."

The federal and provincial governments announced last week that financial aid would be given to limit the mine shutdowns to 25 days. Ottawa is believed contributing about \$400,000 and the Nova Scotia government \$100,000 to finance a 1,400,000-ton

coal stockpile. A committee of Cape Breton mayors was set up last week to ask for Dosco's long-term plans.

Six Dosco mines in Cape Breton were idle last week but resumed production Monday. They will be shut down for various periods later in the summer. Other mines employing about 1,300 men are closed this week.

TARIFF EXPERT MOVED

OTTAWA (CP)—Dr. Claude Isbister is switching from tariffs to taxes. The assistant deputy minister of trade is shifting over to the finance department, to become assistant deputy minister of finance, concentrating on tax-setting policy. 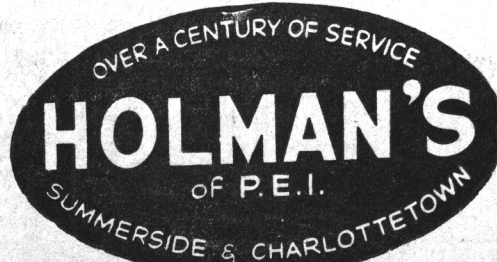
