THE LIBERALS AND PROTECTION

In convention assembled at Ottawa (1893) the Liberal party declared:

"We denounce the principle of protection as radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our convictions that any tariff changes based on that principle, must fail to afford any substantial relief from the burdens under which the country labors. This issue we unhesitatingly accept, and upon it we await with the fullest confidence the verdict of the electorate of Canada."

At the same convention Sir Wilfrid Laurier said:

"We will tax for revenue, but not one cent for protection. Taxation is an evil that nothing but the requirements of the Government can justify. When we are in power—and I don't want to sell the skin of the bear until the bear is shot; yet I think the Tory bear is about to be skinned—we will free the people from protection, which is a fraud, a delusion and a robbery. For it is robbery to take money from one man and give it to another."

Speaking at Newmarket, Sir Wilfrid said:

"I will not be satisfied until the last vestige of protection has been removed from the soil of Canada. Our great reform is to put away from the soil of Canada the last vestige of protection."

In the course of his numerous addresses to the people Sir Louis Davies said:

"We have been attacking this policy year by year. This is an accursed system, a system accursed of God and man."

Sir Richard Cartwright said:

"I say our protective system was a huge mistake, in so far as it was honest at all, and in so far as it was not honest it was a huge scheme of robbery."

And again Sir Richard said:

"Our policy from first to last has been to destroy the villainous system of protection by free trade, a revenue tariff or continental free trade."

Notwithstanding these statements and thousands of others, made by the same gentlemen and their partisans to the same effect, the tariff of Canada is, in principle, as protective as it ever was,—it is to all interests and purposes a protective tariff;—and judging of the future by the past it is likely to remain so. The Liberals have stolen the Conservatives' Protection clothes and, in our opinion—we may be wrong—they intend to keep the Conservative Protection clothes on.

—Among the infallible signs of a Dominion election in the near future is the fact, telegraphed from Montreal, that "large crews are being put at work on public enterprises throughout the Dominion." It is safe to say that the whole \$65,000,000, and more, will be expended this year.

BINDER TWINE!

The Pioneer remarks:—

"THE EXAMINER makes out that the western farmers are being pandered to for political purposes and P. E. Island farmers neglected. The Northwest Farmer, published at Winnipeg wholly in the interests of the farmers of the West, and undoubtedly the finest agricultural paper published in the west of Canada, views the matter of this shipment of 100 carloads of binder twine in quite a different light from THE EXAMINER. This is what it says editorially in the last issue received at this office:—

"This twine is to be distributed over the country and sold at actual cost by agents of the Department of Agriculture. The Farmer is in full accord with the principle upon which the government is acting in giving the farmers the twine at actual cost. We think, however, that the government has chosen an inopportune time to start this innovation. Implement men feel much injured by this action of the government, and especially so this year, when owing to the drouth they will not be able to sell one-half the supply they have laid in to meet the regular crop without this extra competition."

So it appears that the government has blundered in this as in other matters. We may be sure that here would be no complaints of this kind if a fair proportion of the government's twine had been sent to the Maritime Provinces and sold at cost price—no complaints, at least, on the part of the farmers now compelled to pay 14 cents per pound for twine made in the United States. Perhaps the manufacturers in the States might enter a protest. But we shouldn't mind that.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The first of January next has been fixed upon as the day on which the Commonwealth of Australia shall begin its career. The first day of the Twentieth Century ought to be suspicious.

—It is stated that 7,000,000 bushels of corn were shipped into Canada during the year ended June 30, 1899; and we have no doubt that an equal quantity, or even a greater quantity, was imported from the States last year. Is it wonderful that our farmers cannot get a price for their oats in their home markets, and the neighboring provinces, and that subsidized steamers have to be obtained to carry oats to England?

IN THE PHILIPPINES

An American Engineer's Party Captured by Insurgents.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—The first serious check which the American troops have met in the Philippines during the past two months is recorded in a despatch received from General McArthur.

The message is dated Manila, Aug. 4, and says that First Lieut. Alsterlitz, Corps Engineers, U. S. A., with an escort of fifteen men were attacked Aug. 1, on the road between San Miguel de Mayama, Luzon, and San Isidro, Luzon, by an armed band of insurgents reported to have been 150 strong. The entire party was killed, wounded or captured.

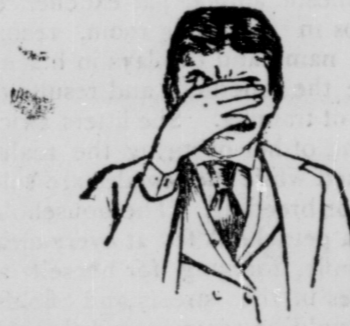
