We understand that the shop of Mr. Patrick Delany, Watchmaker, was broken into on Wednesday night last. We have not heard what was taken, but this shows the great necessity that exists for a force of police in Summerside.

The Postmaster General paid Summerside a visit on Wednesday last for the purpose of ascertaining, by personal observation, what improvements are required in the Postal arrangements of this County. We understand that he intends to recommend to the Government a number of changes, which, if adopted, will give very general satisfaction. We have, in spite of much opposition and ridicule, long contended for some necessary improvements being made in the Post Office Department in this County, and we are happy to find that at last there is a fair prospect of the accomplishment of the end for which we have so arduously struggled.

OBITUARY.

It is our painful duty this week to announce the death of the Hon. T. H. Haviland, Mayor of the City of Charlottown, who died on Tuesday, the 18th inst. No man in the Colony was more widely known or more highly esteemed. He filled for many years some of the highest offices in the Colony, yet he scarcely made an enemy, and his private and attached friends were almost as numerous as his acquaintances. In a small community like ours the loss of such a man as Mr. Haviland will be long and deeply felt. His age was, we believe, 72 years.

We exceedingly regret to learn from the Scotsman of the 25th ult., of the death at Dundas Castle, on the morning of 24th May, of Lady MARY DUNDAS, no other of our highly respected Lieutenants Governor, George Dundas, Esquire. No particulars have been received, as the sad event took place just the day previous to the departure of the English Mail from Liverpool. We feel assured that all classes in this community will deeply sympathize with His Excellency in his trying bereavement.—Patriot, June 8.

Latest by Telegraph!

Berlin, June 14. King William and Count Von Bismarck arrived here from Paris.

Dramstadt, June 15. The Emperor Alexander, of Russia is here for a brief sojourn.

Dublin, June 15. It is reported that during the attempt to rescue the Fenian prisoners on Thursday last, the military and the police came in close quarters with the rioters. The bayonet was freely used, and a number of the rioters were bayoneted, and two deaths have taken place.

Dublin, June 14. It is supposed that the Fenians who were captured a short time ago at Dungarvon, were subsequently taken to Waterford and confined in jail. This week they have been undergoing a preliminary examination, and the testimony given so far shows that four of them had been officers in the United States army during the late rebellion. It has already been reported that Corydon, who was one of the chief witnesses against them, had been roughly handled by a mob. Yesterday, while the prisoners were being conducted from the court house to the jail, in charge of a strong police force, a crowd of sympathizing friends gathered from all parts of the city, and made a fierce attack upon the Guards with the intention of rescuing the prisoners. A fight ensued, during which some 30 of the police were injured. One of the attacking party was killed, and 6 reported to have been wounded by the fire of the guard. The latter made a stout defence, and succeeded in safely depositing their prisoners in the city prison after the crowd dispersed.

The trial of the Fenian, Walsh, and his companions, which has been in progress before the special commission in session at Limerick has resulted in the conviction of all. London, June 14. It is reported that the negotiations, which for some time have been pending between the cabinets of Copenhagen and Berlin with reference to Schleswig, have been concluded, but the results at which the two Governments arrived has not yet been made public.

Despatches from Athens report that many volunteers have left Greece to reinforce the ranks of the Christian patriots in Candia, and a large volunteer corps has been established in that Island. Paris, June 16. It is understood that the Shah of Persia to whom an autograph letter of invitation from the Emperor had been sent to visit this Capital during the International Exposition will be unable to save his Government.

Dublin, June 16. Several additional cases of high treason were tried before the Special Commission at Limerick, last week and resulted in the conviction of the accused.

New York, June 14. Rio Janeiro correspondence, dated 7th, says the cholera is raging in that city and in the camp on the River Platte, and had taken off nearly 700 men in four days. Two thousand troops had been despatched to Corinth to restrain the populace from destroying the hospitals.

Buenos Ayres letters give doleful accounts of the cholera in that city. The streets of the city were filled with funerals, and people were lying in the hedges and on the door steps. Everywhere crowds were rushing away from the infection, and every little hamlet in the interior was crowded with affrighted refugees. Gold 137.

Mr. Pope's ship was launched on Tuesday last. She is a splendid vessel, and reflects the highest credit on the skill of Mr. McKinnon, as a naval architect. She is of about 300 tons burthen, copper fastened, and beautifully modelled. We believe that this fine vessel is not yet named. Some time after the launch we were told that she was called "The New Dominion." We thought at the time that the name was a capital one, and we really hope that Mr. Pope will adopt it. We don't think that it can be changed for a better.

The Sch. "Summerside" sailed from this port for Great Britain on Friday last. She took a full cargo of oats, shipped by Charles Green and R. T. Holman, Esquires.
