

Local and Other Items.

TIMOTHY SEED is scarce. A SMALL market to-day. MONDAY is Declaration Day. HON. PETER GAVIN is in the city. DR. MUTTART has returned from Ottawa. REV. A. OSBORNE has arrived from Montreal. PLOUGHING is the order of the day—in the country. THERE is an extraordinary rise in property in British Columbia. BAZAR DRESSMAKERS, just received at the London House. The "St. Lawrence" was in Summerside this morning when the train left. HORSES and cattle continue to advance in price throughout British Columbia. THE Summerside Journal is just now the best example we know of 'invincible ignorance.' THE "Northern Light" returned to Georgetown from Pictou, last night, with mails and passengers. BRITISH COLUMBIA'S contribution to the Customs revenue at all points for April foots up to \$70,000. A MEAT DEALER from Halifax bought, to-day, a quantity of veal, mutton and poultry for the Halifax market. HORSE-FEVERS are arriving every day. They say "horses are cheaper" at some than here. Heavy horses are in demand. THE members of the Cricket Club will meet at Victoria Park to-morrow afternoon to make arrangements for the coming season. THE steamer "Princess of Wales" reached Pictou this forenoon at 11.15. As there is considerable ice in Pictou harbor, she will not return until to-morrow. IN Halifax, on Wednesday, a man named Charles Moore, formerly of the Royal Engineers, committed suicide by cutting his throat. He was of dissipated habits and almost constantly in liquor. THE second Mrs. Longfellow looked like the well-known picture of "Evangeline." She had large, lambent dark eyes, and a low, broad brow, shaded by a quantity of dark hair. She was tall, stately, and graceful. THE fire at the residence of J. R. Bourke, Esq., Mill View, on Sunday last, originated by a spark from the fine setting fire to the gable. The flames spread rapidly, and the house was totally consumed in one hour. Only a small lot of furniture was saved. The loss is estimated at \$3,000. No insurance. A NUMBER of English Shire-horses were recently sold at Chicago by Col. Judy. The prices paid ranged from £145 to £360. Hard Times fetched £305, Milton Duke £237, Prince Tom and Prince of the Isle £230 each. Honest Heart £360. Twenty-one animals made the very respectable average of £215. MR. GEORGE A. LAIRD, a native of P. E. Island, a graduate of Dalhousie, and who last year married a Halifax lady, has recently been elected one of the first Councilors of Braddon. His property, as well as that of some Nova Scotian in the same district, has become very valuable.—New Glasgow (N. S.) Chronicle. A GENTLEMAN walking up Great George street last night was attacked by a large-musk-rat which came out of the sewer near W. E. Dawson & Co.'s hardware store. The gentleman kicked viciously at the rodent and succeeded in killing his ratship after he had made the second attack. The remains are now on exhibition at Monarch Billiard Hall. NOT SO HUMBLE AT ALL.—The editor of the Moncton Times factiously alludes to the editor of the Patriot as the discoverer of some of the hidden abilities of Mr. Edward Blake. This wonderful discoverer he calls "an humble editor." The usually modest editor of our contemporary is stung, and retorts sharply: "Not so humble at all." This is a fact. AT the election on Monday it became known that a Liberal Conservative had fallen from grace and landed in Gridiron. A Conservative gentleman met him yesterday, and after addressing him a word of sympathy, said he should never leave the party without being paid for his services. Diving his hand into a remote corner of his pocket, one cent was procured, passed to "the fallen," and a receipt in full was demanded.—Fact. MILITARY.—We learn that Georgetown Battery is undergoing a course of drill and instruction under Sergeant Joseph Phillips, from the Royal School of Gunnery, Quebec. A 24 pounder, gun of 50 cwt. has been obtained from the Charlottetown Battery for drill purposes, until the opening of navigation, when we understand the battery will be supplied with guns, stores etc. from the Militia Department.—Advertiser. A PICTURESQUE story of the Franco Prussian war is told in Paris M. Ambrose Thomas, the composer, was forced before the siege to abandon his beautiful villa at Argenteuil, which was full of artistic treasures. When the Prussians entered the place one of their officers inquired for Thomas' house, and writing a few lines on a card slipped it under the door. On the garden gate he wrote a few words in German. Many German regiments passed through Argenteuil, and were quartered in its houses, but the composer's remained untouched. When the war was over Thomas returned to his villa to find everything as he left it; and on the card which had been slipped under the door he read a German name, and written beneath it, "The nephew of Meyerbeer."

Lord Cavendish's Funeral.

PARNELL THREATENED.

LONDON, May 11. Information has just been received of a terrible explosion of fire damp at Plint mine at Bechham, West Pholia. The bodies of fifty-five victims have thus far been recovered. NEW YORK, May 11. At a reception tendered to Mrs. Parnell to-night, by the Ladies Land League, that lady said: "There were important messages between my husband and Mr. Gladstone before the release. He did not consent to accept release until Mr. Gladstone agreed to introduce the four amendments to the Land Act, which were introduced, and which were framed by Charles Stewart Parnell, while in Kilmalsham Jail." DUBLIN, May 11. There have been further arrests in Drogheda, Longford and County Meath in connection with the murder of Cavendish and Burke. LONDON, May 11. One of the most conspicuous features of Lord Cavendish's funeral, to-day, was the assemblage of 5,000 tenants of the Duke of Devonshire, father of Lord Frederick Cavendish. It is stated that Parnell has applied for and received from the police protection owing to rumors current and threatening letters he has received to the effect that he is a marked man.

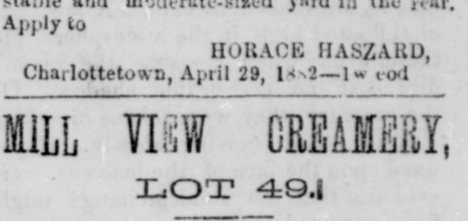
