OTTAWA AND HULL FIRE.

DEATH OF MRS. G. D. LONGWORTH.

Sorrow, sincere and heartfelt, pervades many homes in this city, to-day, on account of the sudden death of Mrs. George D. Longworth, whose spirit passed away last evening. The deceased lady walked down town yesterday forenoon. About noon she called at the office of the Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, said that she felt very tired, and asked to be allowed to rest for a few minutes. She then desired a glass of water, and immediately became very ill. Physicians were called, and after some time she so far recovered as to be able to endure removal to her home. A slight hope of her recovery was entertained for a few hours. But, in the evening, she passed quietly away.

We heartily sympathize with her bereaved husband, son and daughter, as well as with the large circle of relatives to whom she was endeared. She was a daughter of the late Honorable George Coles, a prominent member of St. Paul's Church, active and liberal in good works, and popular throughout the city. The Longworth Ward in the P. E. Island Hospital is a lasting and beneficent memorial of her practical charity.

—The United States Senate would not consider a resolution of sympathy with the Boers who ruthlessly invaded British territory in the Transvaal. The wonder is that any senator could be found to submit such a resolution.

—The results of the Ottawa fire have been summarized as follows:
Dead—Seven.
Homeless—15,000.
Buildings burned—3,000.
Hands out of work—5,000.
Value of property destroyed—\$15,000,000.

Englishmen Preferred.

LONDON, May 2.—The Daily Express professes to have received authentic information from St. Petersburg that the Czar has granted to a British syndicate a concession to work the gold deposits on his majesty's private estate in the Nertchinsk region in Siberia. Overtures have been made by French and German applicants for this concession but the grant is intended, it is declared, as a practical proof of the Czar's desire to stand well with Great Britain.

Another Fatal Accident.

PARIS, May 1.—There was another accident yesterday at the Exposition. A scaffolding collapsed in the Sale des Fetes. One workman was killed and three seriously injured.

MILITARY TERRORISM.

Bad State of Affairs in Austria-Hungary.

M. Gabriel Ugron called attention in the Hungarian House of Deputies a few days ago to an outrage committed by an officer on a private in his regiment. Senior Lieutenant Dembicki, stationed at Karlsruhe, sent a message to a private who was acting as his captain's manservant to harness the captain's horses and drive him to a ball. The private, Anthony Balasch, sent back to say that he could not harness the horse without his own master's express permission. On receiving this reply Senior Lieutenant Dembicki rushed to the stable and commenced a murderous attack on the wretched private. He dealt the latter 14 wounds with his sword, and cut four fingers of his left hand. Senior Lieutenant Dembicki then went to the ball and danced merrily until morning. His victim, Balasch, lay bleeding in the stable all night, and was unconscious when found there in the morning. He was removed to the hospital, but his condition is hopeless.

Another example of Austrian militarism was afforded at Trient station on the Southern Railway. An officer, Lieut. Adalbert Zalay de Hagyaros was in a hurry to take his ticket, and ordered a score of civilians who were waiting in front of the ticket office to make way for him. The civilians naturally declined to do so, whereupon Lieut. Adalbert Zalay de Hagyaros ordered a policeman present to arrest them all. The policeman refused to arrest them, saying that he had no right to do so. Lieut. Adalbert Zalay de Hagyaros sent for a detachment of troops from the barracks, who marched down, arrested the policeman, and all the civilians, and formed a cordon around the station while the lieutenant took his ticket.

OBITUARY.

At Peake's Station, on April 8th, Ronald A. McDonald quietly departed this life in the fifty-second year of his age. The deceased was in his usual good health until about five weeks previous to his death, when he was suddenly stricken down by a severe illness, which proved fatal, despite all the aid that medical skill could render. His many friends will learn with sorrow of his sudden death, which has cast a gloom over the community in which he lived. He was in early life known in many parts of this province as a successful school teacher having labored in that profession for upward of eleven years. His remains, followed by a large concourse of people, were on April 10th conveyed to St. Teresa's Church, where a solemn Mass of Requiem was chanted by his devoted pastor, Rev. I. R. A. McDonald, P. P., and afterwards interred in the adjoining cemetery. The obsequies were performed by His Lordship Bishop McDonald of Charlottetown. He leaves a wife, five sons and one daughter, besides a large number of friends and relatives to mourn their loss.
