Provincial Exhibition.

At twelve o'clock to-day, His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor, opened the Provincial Exhibition of 1882. When His Honor arrived, a large number of spectators were present. On behalf of the Exhibition Commissioners, Judge Hensley, Chairman, presented His Honor with the following ADDRESS:

TO HIS HONOR THE HONORABLE THOMAS HEATH HAVILAND, Q. C., Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island.

We, the Commissioners appointed to manage the Exhibition of Agriculture and Industry of Prince Edward Island, thank Your Honor for your attendance on this important occasion.

We are fully aware from experience of the past that (as well because your high and honorable position) you take a deep interest in the prosperity of our Province, and knowing how largely it depends upon the advance and success of the farmer and mechanic, view such Exhibitions as the present as affording a fair index to their progressive state and condition.

We believe that the cattle and articles to-day on these grounds will prove fully equal, if not superior, to any exhibited on former occasions, whilst the large number of entries in almost every department proves that the public interest in such friendly competitions as the present remains unabated.

We trust that the opportunity now offered to the people of this Province to meet here together from all parts to receive and impart information and the results of individual experience in all respects prove profitable and agreeable.

We cannot close without expressing our thankfulness and gratitude to Almighty God for the abundant harvest which has this year rewarded the labor of our husbandmen; yet more for the blessing of peace now prevailing in all parts of the British Dominion and for the recent successful and glorious termination of the war in Egypt which developed again so prominently the traditional gallantry of our Soldiers without distinction of rank or race.

His Honor replied with an excellent practical speech, in which he suggested the formation of a Permanent Agricultural Society for the conduct of Exhibitions and the improvement of Agriculture throughout the Province.
