It is significant that barley is lower than ever in Ontario, since the wholesale repeal of the Scott Act. Are we to infer that "less whiskey" is drunk? The shipbuilding industry in Great Britain continues to be marked by the increasing activity of the past two years. From the Clyde district during the month of September is reported the launching of 24 vessels, with a aggregate tonnage of 41,225 tons. There are 119 vessels under construction on the Clyde, being the same number as were under construction in August, showing that the 24 vessels launched were replaced by new orders.

A Nuisance. Sir,—Passing the premises corner of Great George and Euston Streets a few days ago, I noticed a large quantity of loose straw lying around the open yard, and a hay press in operation. I was told some of the buildings adjoining the cooper's shop were packed with loose hay and straw. Passing the same premises, on a previous occasion, I noticed a lot of cattle penned in the same yard, which was kept in a filthy condition—the stench something intolerable. Inquiring of the agent or owner, revealed the fact that the tenant, a well-known produce dealer, was pressing hay on the premises without permission, and that the yard had not been rented for a cattle and pig pen. As cooper and carriage shops abound in the immediate neighborhood, the nuisance I have complained of, is a menace to the health and safety of the whole district. What are the Corporation about in permitting such a nuisance to exist? I was under the impression that the pressing and storing of loose hay and straw, and the use of yards as cattle and pig pens, is illegal in the city? OBSERVER.

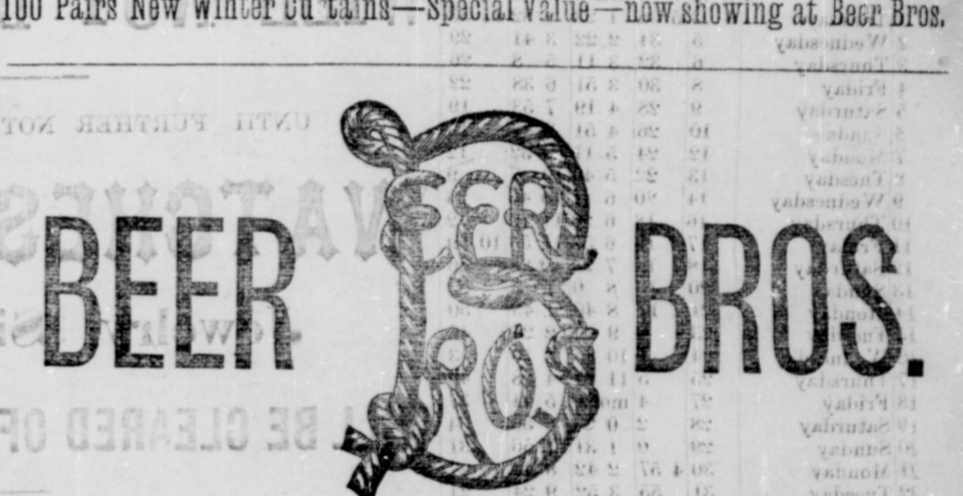
