Family Farm Would Better Under Liberal Rule - Jones

Speaking at Afton Hall, last night, as an active farmer himself, conducting one of the oldest agricultural operations on the Island at Bunbury, B. B. Jones, Liberal candidate for Queen's, along with Mark MacGuigan of Charlottetown, stressed mainly the betterment of the position of the family farm which already had resulted from Liberal government policies and "which would be greatly improved under continued Liberal administration."

He emphasized in this connection the fact that with regard to manufacturing milk subsidy alone, 1,500 accounts had already been processed for P.E.I. dairy farmers, and that cheques representing the difference between the prevailing average price of \$2.70 to \$3.30 a hundredweight would be paid at the interim government-guaranteed price of \$3.50 at once. Another 600 outstanding accounts would be processed next week, he said, and the adjustment was later to be increased to around \$4.00.

"What this means," said Mr. Jones, "is that producers of manufacturing milk will be paid from 30 to 40 cents more per hundredweight for their product than when the Liberals came into power."

Expressed in dollar-returns, said Mr. Jones, "this means an extra return for some 6,000 producers of manufacturing milk of many thousands of dollars in cold cash."

Dr. MacGuigan, in his speech pointed out that with a decided drop in the percentage of the undecided vote, public polls as of this week had placed the Liberals 17 percent over the Conservatives in national returns. He referred to the predictions of such well known observers as Peter Newman as prognosticating that the Liberals would win a minimum of 144 seats against 95 for the Conservatives and 25 for the two splinter parties.

"Mr. Diefenbaker has now admitted," said Dr. MacGuigan, "that the very best the Conservatives can hope to gain in the balloting on Nov. 8 is enough to elect a minority government."

Local Scientist Receives PhD

Dean Read, research scientist in Entomology at the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, received his Doctor of Philosophy degree on Oct. 29 from the University of Western Ontario, London.

During the past two years, Dr. Read has been studying under the direction of Dr. A. W. A. Brown, head of the department of Zoology. His thesis was entitled, "Genetics of dipteran resistance and of longevity of the cabbage maggot."

He has returned to the experimental farm, Charlottetown, where he will continue research on the biology and control of this troublesome insect. In this connection, he will enlarge on his present studies of the various parasites and predators which are an important factor in the control of the cabbage maggot and other soil-borne insects.

Dean Read is a native Islander, having been born in Summerside, P.E.I. and is a son of N.B. Read of Summerside East. He received his early education in Summerside, attended Prince of Wales College, Nova Scotia Agricultural College at Truro and later received his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Macdonald College of McGill University. He is married and has three children.

Parish Renewal Idea Draws Keen Interest

A new approach to parish renewal is being met with keen interest by the members of St. Pius X Parish as the six month program takes shape this week.

The long-range spiritual renewal which began last week under the direction of Rev. Edward Boyce, C.S.R., of Windsor, Ont., makes use of surveys and numerous small group meetings of parishioners in the preparatory phase. Enthusiastic reception of the new method was indicated when a total of 28 reflection groups, in all, 200 parishioners, were formed throughout the parish. Meetings of all groups are to take place this week.

Father Boyce returned to Windsor where he is conducting a three year general mission of Essex County. He expects to come to St. Pius X Parish again at Christmas.

Reflection groups were formed according to the natural groupings of parishioners, such as, high school students; single people, including university students, workers, and nurses; and married people. Appointed as co-ordinators of the various divisions are Mr. and Mrs. Melville MacDougall, East Royalty, for the married people; Margaret Perry, Sherwood, for the single people; and for the high school students, James Paquet, Parkdale, and Linda Gaudet, Parkdale. Mrs. Robert Nightingale, Sherwood, is the general secretary.

Last Sunday evening, reflection group members attended a service of commitment conducted by the pastor, Rt. Rev. P.F. MacDonald, V.G., to invoke the aid of the Holy Spirit on the new parish venture.

The small group meetings are designed to help the parishioners relate their Christian faith to matters of daily life. They are held in homes throughout the parish every two weeks, without the use of any set program or book, leaving the members free to choose their own topics for discussion.

Written reports are then forwarded to Father Boyce, the renewal director, to be studied in preparation for the final or preaching phase of the renewal. This is scheduled to take place during the last two weeks of Lent. The subject matter of the sermon during the preaching phase will be determined by the teaching of the Church in the Second Vatican Council; and by the needs of the people as determined by the surveys and reports of the reflection groups.

It has been noted by the pastor, Msgr. MacDonald, that the new approach to parish renewal in St. Pius X Parish coincided with an approach recommended by Pope Paul in a recent address where he asked for "a human and earthly theology" obtained from the "consideration of earthly realities, strengthened by the desire to understand the contemporary world to exalt its values and serve its needs and accept its ways of speaking and living."
