S'ide Men Rescued From Capsized Boat

SUMMERSIDE — Three Summerside men were rescued from the harbor after their sailboat had capsized about 6 p.m. Saturday.

The sailing trio, Richard Wedge, Richard Wedge (cousins of same name) and Ronald Swayze, had been clinging to their overturned boat for about three-quarters of an hour when they were rescued by Sidney Forbes, accompanied by his brother, Leading Seaman Jim Forbes, who cruised out into the harbor in an outboard motor boat and sighted the capsized sailing boat.

The plight of the sailboat occupants had been spotted by persons ashore reporting the incident to police who had located a boat and were enroute to the scene when the Forbes brothers completed the rescue. They towed the boat back to its mooring place at Glovers Shore.

The three men in the water had life-saving packets and collars with them, but decided to stay with the overturned boat due to the distance from shore. With an incoming tide and a shoreward wind they hoped it would eventually carry them within swimming distance of shore.

by Premier Duplessis, a way must be found to make them acceptable.

Mr. Diefenbaker said he's changed his mind about the necessity of committee study for his bill of rights and will bring it in early next session to go before a joint parliamentary committee.

A federal grant of \$5,000 was announced for the fund to aid families distressed by the death of Northumberland Straits storm off New Brunswick last month.

Health Minister Monteith said he doesn't agree with a suggestion that a royal commission should study all aspects of the drug industry.

CHURN OUT BILLS

Ten pieces of legislation, all minor or reduced in importance, were whipped through the Commons. Included was an act to amend the Combines Investigations Act and the Criminal Code, but the heart had been sliced from the original bill and left until next session.

Justice Minister Fulton explained that additional representations had been received since the bill was introduced. The three deleted sections would have provided manufacturers with the right to withhold products from retailers persistently using them as loss leaders—below-cost bargains sold to attract customers—and would have curbed misleading advertising.

The government ejected one of two proffered Senate amendments to the Income-Tax Act and the Senate conceded it had ventured into the area of tax imposition, which the constitution places solely within the scope of the Commons.

The brief Sunday sitting of Parliament was believed by officials to be the first since 1919 when a similar push was made toward prorogation and the actual ceremony took place the following Monday.

The session was the second of the 24th Parliament—it had lasted 127 days after beginning Jan. 15—and was the longest since 1956.

MUST REMAIN STRONG

The throne speech read by Chief Justice Patrick Kerwin of the Supreme Court, deputy governor-general, expressed Canadian hopes that substantial progress toward international accord will be made at any summit meeting. But it was essential to remain strong through the North Atlantic alliance.

It reviewed the long list of legislation passed during the session and noted the visit of the Queen and President Eisenhower's participation in the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Partisan political jabbing was plentiful during the long day. Compulsory Civil Defence training should be introduced on Sweden's example, suggested Laurier Regnier (PC—St. Boniface). He said Sweden has spent \$200,000,000 on shelters and Civil Defence. Each Canadian should be encouraged to have his own shelter.

But he was convinced evacuation of large centres would be useless. Arnold Peters (CCF—Timiskaming) agreed, saying a traffic even now couldn't move out of a city the size of Ottawa for several hours at rush periods.

Mr. Diefenbaker outlined proposed routine for converting Canada into a condition of state-of-war emergency in the event of nuclear attack. He agreed with Mr. Pearson that any nuclear war probably would strike so speedily that it would be impossible to summon Parliament.

PRODUCTIVE PROVINCE

SUMMERSIDE — Gordon Mayhew of Mount Tryon was taken to Prince County Hospital in Summerside last night with undetermined injuries after the car he was driving rolled over a couple of times.

The accident occurred about a mile from Crapaud throwing the driver and a companion, Alliston, believed from Tryon from the badly smashed car.

The car had been traveling on a long downward road which leads past the homes of Frank and Norman MacDonald, and the vehicle overturned at the intersection of this road with one leading to Kelly's Cross, at a point near the home of Stewart Sherren.

The extent of the injuries to Mayhew were being determined by X-Ray last night. However his condition was not believed serious.

The other passenger was shaken up but uninjured.

Lunenburg Chief Receives Injuries

SUMMERSIDE — Lunenburg Fire Chief Fred Fox returned to his home yesterday afternoon by car after being discharged from Prince County Hospital where he had been a patient since early Saturday morning as the result of a car accident.

While returning to the Clermont Hotel where he was staying during the Maritime Firemen's Tournament held in Summerside, the 1956 Dodge he was driving left the highway near the New Annapolis railway crossing and was badly damaged after rolling over.

Mr. Fox suffered three broken ribs and facial injuries.
