CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Legislation to be Applied for—The Estimates for the Year.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Mayor Warburton presided and every member of the Board was in his place.

A letter from the Principal of the Halifax School for the Blind, expressing the hope that the grant to that institution would be continued this year, was read and tabled.

The offer of Joseph Steele to keep both sides of the market square clean for \$5 per month was accepted.

An application from the City School Board for \$1,000 on account of the estimates was granted.

The clerk was instructed to advertise for a caretaker for Victoria Park, the preference to be given a man well versed in horticulture.

Councillor Horne, from the special committee appointed at the last regular meeting, submitted a report recommending that legislation be applied for at the forthcoming session of the Provincial Legislature for amendments to the Act of Incorporation as follows:—

1. Providing for the retirement of a commissioner and holding an election by the citizens for commissioner of sewers and water supply.
2. To abolish representation in the City Council by wards.
3. Number of councillors, eight, to be elected in the same manner as the mayor.
4. To provide for election of mayor and councillors by ballot, giving each elector a right to vote in each ward wherein he has a qualification.
5. To provide for payment of each of the councillors at the rate of one hundred dollars per annum.
6. To increase tax on banks to \$250 each per annum.
7. Power to issue debentures for the purchase of an electric light plant to be owned and operated by the city.
8. To regulate and tax clubs.

After discussion the report was ordered to lie on the table.

Councillor Crabbe then introduced the estimates for the year. They are as follows:

In submitting the estimates Councillor Crabbe expressed himself as favorable to adding two policemen to the force, and moved that the City Clerk be authorized to advertise for application for the position from men not over 28 years of age.

The motion was seconded by Councillor Nicholson.

Councillor Crabbe's motion was lost on division. It was supported by Councillors Crabbe, Nicholson and Taylor, and opposed by Councillors Hooper, Horne, Wheatley and McCarron.

Councillor Crabbe introduced the usual assessment by-laws which were read a first and second time. The rate of assessment was fixed at one per cent on real estate and seven-eighths of one per cent on personal property.

At a meeting of the Board held this morning the by-laws were read a third time and passed. They are to be published for two weeks in THE EXAMINER and Patriot newspapers.

MR. FULLERTON'S LECTURE

Interesting and valuable information concerning the "Green Isle of the Sea" was combined in the lecture of the Rev. Mr. Fullerton, delivered in St. James' Hall, last evening, with mental recreation and wholesome amusement for the large audience. Mr. Fullerton's vivid verbal descriptions were supplemented by splendid stereopticon views of Irish scenery, under the management of Mr. Morrison, and by beautiful Irish songs, well sung by Mr Charles Bell, Mr. Eric McLean, and Miss Stewart. The Giant's Causeway and the celebrated Lakes of Killarney, were the chief objective points of the lecture, and all were enlivened by the relation of incidents in Irish history and witty Irish stories. In concluding Mr. Fullerton thanked the audience for their appreciation of the efforts of the Y. M. L. A. of St. James Church, as shown in this and the previous lectures of the season now brought to a close; and eloquently expressed the hope that the excellent features of the characters of the English, Scotch and Irish people would be perpetuated by their sons and daughters in this Canada of ours.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.—The Provincial Legislature will meet at 4 o'clock on Monday afternoon. The guard of honor will be under command of Major Crockett, No 4 Co., York. The usual salute from Fort Edward will be fired by a detachment from No 1 Co., C. A., under command of Major H. M. Davison.

THE MAILS.—The mails are to be transferred from the Capes route to the Stanley on Thursday morning. The mails brought to the Capes on Wednesday night will be brought over by the iceboats on Thursday and this will be their last trip. Today's mail had not arrived at Cape Tormentine from Aulac at half-past twelve, owing to the bad roads.

FAST TIME TO THE COAST.—The Canadian Pacific Railway is arranging to establish a very fast service between Montreal and the Pacific coast. It is expected that the new service will come into operation some time during May. It is yet too early to say just what the reduction in time will be, but it is understood that at least eight or ten hours will be gained under the new arrangement. The trip across the continent now occupies upwards of six days. With the new time table in force, it will be possible to cover the distance between Montreal and Vancouver in five and one-half days. Specially large and powerful engines are being constructed to haul the fast trains, and no effort will be spared to make the train service of the C. P. R. across the continent the fastest yet attempted by any trans-continental road.
