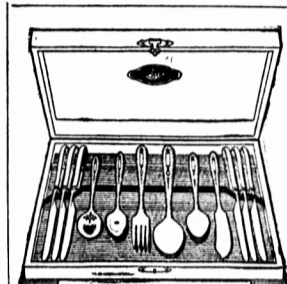

Pleasant Surprise Awaits Fishermen
(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
LIVERPOOL, N. S., May 5—Captain James Sheaves of the Gloucester fishing schooner Andrew and Rosalie arrived in port today to land two Liverpool fishermen he had picked up in the fog on the banks and to report the loss of two of his own crew, only to find they had reached shore safely.
Meanwhile, two Yarmouth fishermen rowed their dory into that port yesterday after covering 30 miles in 20 hours. They had become separated from their mothership, a 45 foot motorvessel under Captain Henry Rogerson.
Separated from the small motorvessel "179" by a dense fog early Sunday morning, Arthur Dalby and Murton Thorburn of Liverpool set their course by compass for shore and started the 50 mile row.
On Sunday they sighted the Gloucester schooner and hailed her.
