

Rangers Lose Close Game To Leafs Saturday Night

TORONTO, Nov. 19 — (CP) — Rangers don't require the services of New York psychologist Dr. David F. Tracy to cure their ills. The lowly National Hockey League team needs only an effective answer to Toronto Maple Leafs' five-man power play — and its quota of luck.

This was apparent Saturday night as Rangers, seeking their second victory in 16 starts this season, dropped a 5-4 decision to the Leafs before 13,700 fans. Three Toronto goals were scored as a direct result of the Leafs' now-famous ganging attack and with a Ranger player watching proceedings from the penalty box.

Topping it off, Jackie McLeod, 20-year-old right-winger from Regina, Sask., will be lost to the Blue-shirts for six weeks. He is in a Toronto hospital with a fractured collar bone suffered when he crashed into the boards by the Leafs' Bill Bariko with only 10 seconds of the game remaining. There was no penalty on the play.

Rangers, who accepted the services of Dr. Tracy a few days ago in an effort to get them out of the doldrums, didn't heed his advice to "stay out of the penalty box" and that was their undoing.

They held a 4-2 lead midway through the last period on two goals each by Eddie Kullman and Tony Leswick. But an interference penalty to Jack Evans, rugged defenceman brought up from Cincinnati of the American League earlier in the week, gave the opportunist Leafs their chance.

Before he returned, Ted Sloan and Captain Ted Kennedy finished off power plays with goals, and with the clubs at full strength Jec Klukay scored in at 16:48 to end the cashing. Other Toronto goals were scored by Sid Smith and Jim Thomson.

Rangers, outshot 31 to 29 by the Leafs, took Chuck Rayner out of the nets with 46 seconds of the game remaining but couldn't click.

DETROIT 2, BOSTON 1
BOSTON, Nov. 19 — (AP) — George Gee and Gordie Howe combined to give Detroit Red Wings a 2-1 victory over Boston Bruins Saturday night in a National Hockey League game before a 8,781 crowd at the Boston Garden.

The revamped Bruins, who last week tried to strengthen their lagging forces by obtaining three players in trades, fell behind early in the opening session and were out-played the rest of the way.

Pivotman Gee put the Wings out in front during the sixth minute of play and, after 25 seconds of second-period action, Howe notched the winning counter with Ted Lindsay and Captain Sid Abel assisting.

The Bruins' sole counter came during the 13th minute of the middle session with Lorne Ferguson converting Johnny Pierson's set-up on a five-man wave.

Two of Boston's new acquisitions, forwards Vic Lynn and Dunc Fisher, played on a line centred by Eddie Sandford. Wild Bill Ezinicki, who came to the Bruins with Lynn in a deal with Toronto, was used as a utility forward.

MONTREAL 3, CHICAGO 2
MONTREAL, Nov. 19 — (CP) — Calum (Baldy) MacKay fired the winning goal Saturday night with 13 seconds remaining as Montreal Canadiens defeated Chicago Black Hawks 3-2 before a crowd of 14,353. It was MacKay's second goal of the night.

Canadiens moved into a third-place tie with the Hawks in the National Hockey League standing before the teams moved on to Chicago for a Sunday night game.

Maurice Richard scored Canadiens' first goal and Roy Conacher and Doug Bentley counted for the Hawks, all three goals coming in the second period when the scoring team had a one-man advantage.

The game was rugged, MacKay and Al Dewsbury were given major penalties for fighting and Jack Stewart of the Hawks had a 10-minute misconduct penalty added leaving the ice.

Harry Lumley of the Hawks had 31 shots to handle—18 in the last period—against 23 for Gerry McNeil.

Richard's goal was his 10th of the season and his first in seven games.

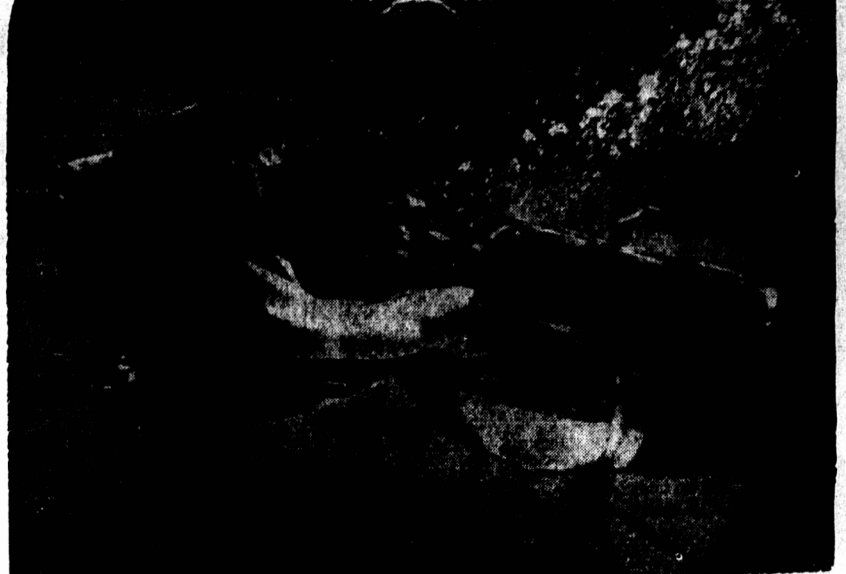
