Messrs Delany & Byrne have moved across Queen Street, to the store formerly occupied by Hugh Monaghan; and James Reddin, Esq., has located himself in the place left by the former.

Mr. Walter Gaul, who fell, two weeks ago, from Mrs. Blake & Sons new house, died at 2 o'clock, on Friday night last.

La Minerve, an organ of the Canadian Government, intimates that the Imperial Government have undertaken to decide how the Fenian convicts shall be disposed of, and that the Canadian Government are thus relieved from all responsibility.

The Treasurer of the Quebec Relief Fund, in Halifax, has forwarded a second remittance to the sufferers, of two thousand five hundred dollars.

Up to the 5th inst., \$10,300 were collected in New York for the sufferers by the Quebec fire, in sums varying from \$500 to \$5.

A notice of the ceremony of dedicating the new Catholic Church at Pictou is in type, but unavoidably crowded out.

John Morrissey, the pugilist, has been elected to Congress by one of the New York Districts.

An Island correspondent of the Halifax 'Citizen' says that 'the Island Government have erected a light on St. Peter's Island for the accommodation of the Steamboat Company, and said nothing about it in any of the papers or books of directions, and a number of vessels have been misled in consequence.

The latest telegram by the Atlantic Cable announces the appointment of a Commission to settle the Alabama claims.

Our excellent correspondent 'C.' intimates that he is in favor of Confederation. In his case, we think 'tis distance lends enchantment to the view.

There have been several alarms of fire in Halifax of late, without much damage; but on the night of the 10th instant, a serious loss was sustained in the total destruction by fire of the Old Military Hospital.
