## REPLACING SHEETS

Before buying sheets it's a good idea to know a little about them. Too loose a weave makes a weak sheet that easily soils and wrinkles. A sheet that has a too heavy weave does not give that much added durability and proves rather difficult to launder. Loose or heavy weave can be determined by thread count (the sum of threads per inch lengthwise and widthwise). The label on a good sheet usually states the type of sheet, whether torn rather than cut, and may give its thread count. For good service a sheet should have a thread count of at least 128. This would include Percale (180-200) Muslin, Heavy Muslin (140) and Medium Muslin (128).

Percale is one type of sheet made from finest combed cotton yarns. Closely woven with a luxury finish it is light in weight and gives excellent service but it is more expensive than muslin. Muslin is ordinary sheeting but the threads used are heavier than percale. Heavy muslin gives the best wear for money spent. Laundering may be more of a chore though. Good wear can be expected from medium muslin but light muslin is not recommended. Nylon sheets, either knitted or woven, give excellent wear (approximately 20 years). Tricot sheets fit well; woven ones stretch somewhat with use but retain their original form when laundered. Some users find nylon sheets, slippery and complain of clamminess in humid weather or static in dry; others find no such drawback. Size is important and the best sheet length for all round serviceability is the 104" hemmed size. It will allow for shrinkage, a good

tuck-in at the foot of the bed without causing strain during use and still provide a protecting wide border at the top of the blanket underneath. Correct widths for single, three-quarter and double bed size sheets are 65", 72" and 81". Buy your sheets with care and get longer wear.
