FREDERICTON WATER WORKS.—Including interest charges, the cost of the Fredericton water works the past year amounted to \$12,000. The receipts only slightly exceeded \$6,000, or less than one-half the cost. The total consumption of the city reached 197 million gallons.

CANADIAN MARKETS.—With such markets for our potatoes in Quebec, Montreal and other Canadian cities, it is a wonder that more shipping to those ports is not being done. In the Province of Quebec the potato crop is a failure. In country places they sell readily at 50 cents per bushel.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.—New rails have been laid down on the Intercolonial railway for a length of forty miles in the Metapedia Valley. Mr. F. P. Millar, engineer, of Montreal, has obtained the contract for building the steel bridge at the railway station at River du Loup. This bridge will be 350 feet long, and be estimated to cost \$25,000 to \$30,000. Reservoirs are to be erected along the line at St. Pierre, St. Helene, River du Loup, Hadlow and St. Charles of a capacity of 50,000 gallons each.

DETAINED BY THE TIDES.—Recent advices from Rockland, Me., say that thirteen vessels loaded with lime are detained at that port by the low tides. The vessels are all ready to go to sea, and the crews are on board drawing salary. The expense of each vessel is said to be \$8 per day. They have already been waiting three days and will probably have to wait four or five days longer. The total expense for all thirteen vessels will be about \$650. It is said by old sailors that the tides never were so low before.

THE LYCEUM.—An audience that almost filled the Lyceum welcomed Manager H. Price Webber last night. The drama of "Aurora Floyd" was the bill, and well as it performed. Miss Edwina Grey, as Aurora, was excellent, and received a great deal of merited applause. All the company appeared to advantage, and the enthusiasm of the spectators was something remarkable. The farce of "Rough Diamonds" was received with roars of laughter. Mr. Webber, as Cousin Joe, being very funny and his local jokes were very good indeed. To night "Jessie Vere" will be offered.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY.—One of the most successful and largely-attended practices of the season was held in the Philharmonic Hall, by the above society, on last Tuesday evening. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Poisoned Candy Case.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 21. In the Circuit Court today Judge King charged the Grand Jury at length in the Macdonald poisoned candy case. He reviewed all the important evidence exhaustively, and strongly put the material points as telling against the prisoner. The Judge, in concluding, told the Grand Jury that if they thought there was sufficient evidence against McDonald to bring in a true bill. Any question touching the prisoner's insanity must not be considered by them, but the true bill must be brought in and the question of insanity dealt with hereafter. The grand jury found a true bill against Bennett, charged with manslaughter.

The United States of Australia.

Chicago, Nov. 21. Albert Boulton, of Abury, Australia, who is in the city, said to a reporter last night that the project of consolidating the Australian continent into one powerful state is slowly but surely gaining ground there, and that within two years a definite plan for founding a new nation will be forwarded to the Colonial Office for the endorsement of the Crown. Before long, and without the slightest commotion in England or in Australia, the Mother Country will see this great group of her colonies pass into the new nation of the United States of Australia.

French Affairs.

Paris, Nov. 21. In the Chamber of Deputies to-day, Leydet offered a motion in favor of allowing the free manufacture of matches. At present a company pays the state for the possession of a monopoly of the business. Rouvier, minister of Finance proposed to withdraw the company's concessions, and establish a direct government monopoly. This proposal was rejected—312 to 326. Leydet's motion carried—292 to 232. The defeat of the government caused a sensation, and is looked upon as a bad augury for the Ministry.

On the Rack.

Ottawa, Nov. 21. The court martial held yesterday at Victoria, on the officers of the warship Amphion, resulted in the captain being reprimanded and the first lieutenant being deprived of a year's seniority, for allowing the vessel to strike on the rocks while conveying the Governor-General from Victoria to Vancouver. The officers say that Admiral Heneage is to blame, as he refused to provide a pilot for the vessel.

Mormons in Canada.

Ottawa, Nov. 21. The recent visit of a Mormon leader to Fort McLeod has excited the people there, and Gov. Royal and his advisory council are severely criticized for their failure to prevent the spread of polygamy at the Mormon colony. Protests have been forwarded to Ottawa against the formation of new colonies. The people declare that if something is not done to check the evil, they will take the matter in their own hands.

From Stanley Himself.

London, Nov. 21. The Emin Pascha relief committee received a despatch to-day from Stanley himself announcing his arrival at Mpwapwa, and stating that he expects to reach Zanzibar in four or five days.

Universal Suffrage.

Rio de Janeiro, Nov. 21. The provisional government has issued a decree establishing universal suffrage throughout the Republic.
