WHAT IT WOULD SEE!

Remarking upon a statement of the London Advertiser, the Montreal Star says:

The journal, whether it be one of the loud professions of the Advertiser or not, which sees nothing creditable in a request to "hug the machine," would possibly see as little harm in that other memorable invitation to "Come along, John, and help us put down bribery and corruption; we have lots of money."

"It would see only glory in the battle cry to make a "Big Push."

"It would justify the attempt once made to "mesmerize the electors."

"It would testify that, very properly, "elections are not made by prayers."

"It would believe that the Lincoln Liberal candidate's memoranda, in which the outlay for purchasing votes was put down as "missionary expenses," showed a highly creditable anxiety to spread the gospel.

"I would agree that the Liberal injunction to "poll the vote," to run in personators and pluggers in order to realize Sir Wilfrid's ideal of an honest expression of the public will, was the Liberal conception of "elevating the standard of public morality."

"It would see in every wearer of a title a "Democrat to the hilt,"—if he was a Liberal.

"It would applaud Mr. Blair's peculiar recourse to the "resources of civilization" as an embodiment of that particular plank in the Ottawa platform which denounced bribery and corruption.

"It would see no crime in Mr. Hardy's threat of "cold justice" being done a constituency which did not return a Liberal member.

It would gladly rejoice in the fulfilment of the promise of Mr. Tarte to "Wait until you see us next year," as a full and honest determination to carry out that other Ottawa platform plank which pledged the party to retrenchment and economy.

It would see in the slogan "a Brockville man is good enough for Brockville," the quintessence of a broader national spirit than has ever been.

It would see in "the whole army of workers" who stole ballots and plugged votes and personated scores of electors, who committed crimes on a gigantic scale that was hitherto unknown, a band of honest and earnest patriots animated only by a desire for their country's zeal.

It would hold that "pigs' feet and beer," are more potent and more laudable arguments in its own town than appeals to men's reason and principles.

It would see no guile in a systematic organized body of Government employees invading a constituency to detach it and thwart the public will.

A paper that would do these things, would, too, insist—as the Advertiser does that the Liberal leaders have practiced economy when they have indulged in reckless extravagance, that they are emblems of purity when they are merely sign-posts of scandals and deals, that they are redeeming their pledges when they are deliberately breaking them, and that the machine itself is the grandest type of Liberal statesmanship.

STOCKMAN ANSWERED.

All Imported Cattle Should Have Clean Bill of Health.

Sir,—A writer in your issue of July 19th signing himself "Stockman," addresses an open letter to cattle owners of P. E. Island, in which he takes strong grounds against the enforcement of the act of last session passed with a view of stamping out of tuberculosis in cattle. We would judge from "Stockman's" letter that he is a breeder of stock which he wishes to find a market for in the other Provinces of the Dominion; and we fear that it is fear of retaliation by other provinces, and the consequent expense of inspection that makes him denounce so vigorously the "vets" who are the officers to see that the law is enforced. We are in full sympathy with any measures that will prevent further contagion and stamp out the disease already existing, and we believe that the thorough examination of all cattle brought here by a competent person who will certify that they are free from tuberculosis, if he finds them so after a rigid examination, is the only safeguard the people can have.

Certainly if I wanted to import a bull to head a herd that I was desirous of improving, I should insist on a certificate that he was free from disease signed by a qualified inspector. If I did not I might get an animal that would destroy my herd instead of improving it. But if another person should be engaged in importing cattle for breeding purposes that he would sell on arrival to the farmers he might not look at it in the same way, and to avoid the expense would not get them inspected. Then, I am liable to have my herd infected by contact with the cattle of his importation.

"Stockman's" reference to the increase of tuberculosis in Denmark, if it be true, is to be accounted for largely by the great increase in dairy cattle and the conditions under which they have to be kept. The intensive system of farming, which has been so largely adopted in such countries as Denmark, Holland and in England necessitates keeping cattle housed almost all the year. This housing of cattle in not well ventilated stables, depriving them of sunshine and exercise is a great means of spreading the disease. One animal may infect dozens this way.

Again forcing dairy cattle by overfeeding to make them do their best, or to make records, has a very weakening influence on them and predisposes them to disease.

I think that if the cattle owners of the Island should meet, as suggested by Stockman, it should be in defence of their own rights, and in defence of the rights of every person who consumes the products of our herds, whether it be meat, milk, butter or curds. We all, whether we are cattle owners, mechanics, professional men or laborer, have the right to know that our food is wholesome, and that it will not convey the germs of disease to us. The intelligent progressive stockmen of this country will demand a clear bill of health with every animal they import for breeding purposes, and as we do not import cattle for feeding and in my opinion ought never to need to, I don't think the expense of inspection will be very heavy on us.

I noticed that in the discussion in the House of Commons, Sir Charles Tupper and all others who spoke on the subject, and many of them were scientific men, were in favor of every precaution to prevent the spread of this dangerous disease; and any censure that the Minister of Agriculture received was for lack of more vigorous effort on his part to stamp it out; some going so far as to suggest compensation to owners in some cases.

As we are increasing our herds, especially of dairy cattle, on this Island, we should endeavour to build them up upon a healthy foundation, so that our dairy business should be profitable as it extends, and also not to be a menace to the public health.

A Million in Gold.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—The steamer Homer has arrived from St. Michael's bringing 150 passengers and six boxes of gold. The gold is consigned to the Alaska Exploration Company. Nearly \$1,000,000 came down, the most of it being consigned from Dawson City. About \$100,000 belonged to the passenger.

PROSPECTS OF CANADA.

The Dundee Courier of the 13th inst. remarks that: "Assurances of the loyalty and friendship of Canada are gratifying to the British people, and especially to Scotsmen. The speech delivered yesterday in Dundee by Professor Robertson, Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying at Ottawa, will, therefore, be read with considerable pleasure and satisfaction. Professor Robertson's own success in the Dominion has been specially noteworthy, and by his personal exertions he has done a great deal to develop the resources of the important and prosperous colony. No better proof of the strength of the link of friendship that binds Canada to this country could be obtained than the fact that the Canadian Government has entrusted to a Dundee firm the building of a large mail steamer, and it is evident from Professor Robertson's remarks that, so far as the Dominion is concerned, every possible effort will be put forth to increase commercial intercourse with the Mother Country. On this side the immense capabilities of Canada ought never to be overlooked. The statistics quoted yesterday demonstrated that the great colony is exceedingly rich in natural products, and that the people are steadily availing themselves of the admirable facilities they possess.
