

New Year's Greetings From Montague Mayor, Council

New Year's greetings from Mayor Bruce Yeo and Montague Town Council:

Once again it is my privilege to extend best wishes to you on behalf myself and the Town Council and to extend our sincere wishes to you for your cooperation and assistance during the past year.

Our "pay as you go" policy, adopted some years ago, has been followed again this year and I am proud to announce, once again, that our town has no liabilities. As in the past few years the assessed value of property in the town has increased, indicating the continued growth of our town. With this increase in assessed valuation we also have an increase in the revenue although the tax rate remained the same.

The program of repaving and replacing the sidewalks on the Main Street was completed this year. All sidewalks on the Main Street are now in excellent condition and it is hoped that in the near future that the area between the street and sidewalk may be paved. During the summer all streets paved with light pavement, but it is felt that this section is necessary to preserve your investment. Your co-operation in this matter is earnestly solicited and appreciated. Last winter was a particularly severe winter as far as ice and snow conditions were concerned.

A record amount was spent for snow removal and sanding last winter. Ice conditions are more troublesome in a hilly town and creates a definite problem that at times, is most difficult to overcome.

Improvements were made to the Town Hall during the year. A museum being laid in the Council Chambers and corridors and certain renovations made in the fire hall in the basement. The old Post Office Building has been loaned to the Junior Board of Trade for use as a museum. The Garden of the Gulf Museum Reported that over three thousand visitors were admitted during July, August and September and that they are planning to renovate the second floor to be in use this coming summer. The council feels that this is a real asset to our town and is worthy of our support.

Chief D. H. Coffin reported that there were only four fires in the town during 1957, aside from grass fires, and that damage in these fires did not exceed \$500.00. Chief Coffin and his brigade are to be congratulated on this record. The department made up of twenty volunteers, met regularly during the year for instruction and training and this year inaugurated a fire inspection policy, hiring a man to

Mayor Solomon Has Message For Citizens Of Georgetown

Mayor Solomon greets the citizens of Georgetown with his New Year's message.

His worship, Raymond W. Solomon on behalf of the town Council of Georgetown, extends greetings and best wishes for a happy and prosperous New Year to the citizens of Georgetown.

His Worship reviewed some of the accomplishments of the past year and looked forward with confidence and assurance to still greater progress in the year before us.

He referred to the great loss suffered by the town during the past year, in the death of the late Mayor P. L. Boudreau, whose sudden passing removed from our midst a man who served Georgetown well in civic, social and religious fields, many years. Former Mayor Boudreau's record of service to the town was a fine one, and he is remembered in the history of Georgetown.

During the past year the Council lost the vacant position of Councilor C. A. Scully, occasioned by the death of the late Mayor P. L. Boudreau. The council was fortunate in receiving the nominations of Mr. Marcellus Gottel and Mr. Preston MacDonaid.

Among the 1957 projects cited by the Mayor were the street paving and sub-grading program. Victoria Street was paved from St. James Roman Catholic Church south to Holy Trinity Anglican Church, and continued west for two blocks on Grafton Street, passing the Town Hall and St. David's United Church to the intersection at Fitzroy Street. West end grading and grading was done on Water Street from Kent Street East. Durham Street was widened and shale fill was placed on Glenelg and parts of Richmond and Grafton Streets.

A very extensive program of drain cleaning was carried out, all culverts and catch basins were cleaned. Some new culverts were installed and foot bridges replaced. All telephone and electric light poles in the town were whitened.

The town fire fighting equipment was overhauled and replacements made of parts where necessary. A new suction hose was purchased.

The town sold during 1957, approximately 20,000 tons of shale fill to the County Construction Company for use as fill on the new Railway Wharf.

Calcium chloride was placed on many of the streets, greatly lessening the dust nuisance. All major community facilities were kept in constant repair and in many cases improved.

Two appointments during the year included Mr. Gilbert Gaudet as town magistrate. Mr. John

Judge J. S. DesRoches, chairman of the Red Cross Disaster Relief Services for Southern Kings, yesterday visited the scene of the fire which completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Duncan and family, of Heathdale on Sunday evening, to ascertain if assistance was needed.

Also residing in the house was Mrs. Ronald MacPhee and three small children. Her husband, who is Mrs. Duncan's brother, is employed in Montreal.

On investigating, Judge DesRoches found that kindly neighbors and friends were providing considerable clothing and comforts for the families which were left with nothing but their wearing apparel. The local Disaster Relief unit, headed by Miss Florrie Beaton and Mrs. Leon Johnston were also on hand to provide additional needs.

Both the Duncan and MacPhee families are being made welcome at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Matheson. Mrs. MacPhee expects to join her husband in the near future in Montreal where he is employed by Canadian.

NRC Says Western Science Still Superior To Reds

OTTAWA (CP)—The National Research Council said Monday Western science as a whole still is superior to the level of scientific achievement in Russia.

A council official said the statement was issued to counteract an impression that Soviet advances in rocket techniques and some forms of aircraft design meant that Western scientists are lagging behind their Russian counterparts.

"There is more to science than weapon development and there is no question that Western science as a whole still is ahead," the statement said.

The NRC official said the erroneous impression that Russian science is ahead of the West apparently resulted from the spectacular launching of their earth satellites and development of long-range jet aircraft.

"The NRC translation section has provided a 'good review' of Soviet advances in science."

"As a result, for many years before Sputnik," Canadian scientists in common with all Western scientists had a healthy respect for Russian science which, on the whole, is not very far behind the West," the council official said.

"Now, in the A. S. (After Sputnik) era, many scientists remain convinced that Western science is not inferior to the Russian because of their familiarity with a reasonable cross-section of Russian science over many years. The Canadian scientific community, at least, has been spared the wild swings of the pendulum from unrealistic complacency to equally unrealistic hostility."

In Moscow, Dec. 20, Dr. Alexander Anisimov, president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, said the launching of the Sputnik satellite by the Russians over many years, he added that "great efforts are needed to bring the United States on all scientific fronts."

The NRC statement followed an announcement in certain newspapers that some 30 technical surveys designed to take a one-year course in the Russian language this winter to help prevent duplication of research on scientific problems already solved in Soviet Union.

VOLUME IS GREAT

The mines department said that it hasn't enough personnel to handle the large volume of Russian scientific literature now being received by the department. It hoped that by giving its scientists a knowledge of Russian

science and technology from astronomy to zoology and atomic energy to welding.

"These are scanned by scientists familiar with Russian. They appear to supplement current knowledge in sent to the translation section, where the staff is able to deal with all the major languages."

INDEX MATERIAL

"English translations are prepared and listed in the Canadian translations index. This records all English translations of papers, from any language, that have been translated in the British Commonwealth or in the United States."
