Institute Convention

The ninth annual district convention of Eldon, Mt. Buchanan and Orwell Cove Women's Institutes was held in the Belfast Hall on Monday, July 29th with a comparatively large attendance of Institute members and visitors. The spacious hall presented a very attractive appearance with cut flowers, wild flowers, and ferns also a very good exhibit in handicraft. A particularly attractive feature was a nicely decorated table by Mrs. P. W. Murphy containing holders in many beautiful designs unique and varied which brought many complimentary remarks from members and visitors.

The afternoon session opened at 3:30 p. m. with the Institute Ode followed by the Creed in unison. The address of welcome was given by Miss Matilda B. MacDonald, President, Mt. Buchanan Institute, and the reply by Mrs. Wilfred MacLean, Orwell Cove. Reports of different Institutes were given as follows: Eldon—Mrs. Justin Van-Iderstine, receipts for year \$20.42; Mt. Buchanan—Mrs. J. D. Murchison, receipts for year \$45.57; Orwell Cove—Mrs. Katharine MacDonald, receipts for year \$64.24.

The retiring President, Mrs. Angus Murchison in giving her report stressed the need of greater co-operation in Institute work. A very interesting talk on hooked rugs as seen at the Toronto Exhibition was given by Mrs. T. F. West and also a short talk on interesting spots at the annual convention both were much enjoyed by all present. Another delightful part of the afternoon programme was a talk by Mrs. Murphy on the arrangement of flowers for different table settings. The election of officers followed with result as follows: President, Mrs. John A. MacLeod, Secretary, Miss Estelle MacDonald. An invitation by the Orwell Cove Institute was given to hold the 1937 convention in their hall. Meeting decided to hold decision over and report to the executive at a later date. Mrs. H. D. Johnson, Charlottetown, addressed the convention briefly and collected help from the Ladies Aid of the P. E. I. Hospital in serving lunch at the coming exhibition. Support was heartily given by the members and the committees from the different Institutes are taking care of the matter. On account of being unavoidably detained, Miss Rodd, the Supervisor, was unable to give a demonstration on salads as planned but gave instead a very instructive talk on Institute work and girl's clubs. The question box was well filled with many helpful questions on different phases of Institute work. The chief feature of the evening meeting was an address on "Community Welfare" by Hon. Thane Campbell, Premier of P. E. I. Space will not permit a full account of the hon. gentleman's remarks, but many helpful suggestions were given in beautification of home surroundings at a very small cost. Baby Drowned In Pail Of Water

NEW WATERFORD, N. S. July 27 — (CP) — A 14-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Martell was drowned today when he fell head first into a pail of water. The infant, Charles, was left alone in the room and fell off a chair. The mother found him dead, his feet sticking out of the pail.

Two Chief Phases Marketing Poultry

There are two principal phases in connection with the marketing of poultry in Canada that require very special attention just now, according to the report of the Special Poultry Conference held in Ottawa recently. These two phases are:

1. The weights and grades that are most in demand in Canada for the domestic and export markets.
2. The best means of transportation of live birds from the producer to the market so as to avoid unnecessary loss in weight or deterioration in quality while the birds are in transit.

Ordinarily Canada's chicken crop is marketed for the most part in two weights—broilers, (2-4 lb. and under) and heavy chickens, (4-12 lb. and over.) Neither of these weights fit the largest demand of the British market and during the last few years, the quantity produced in Canada has not been readily absorbed by the home demand.

It is suggested that poultry producers throughout Canada produce one-half of their leghorn and other light weight breeds to market them from 2-4 to 3 lb. each, and during the three weeks immediately preceding the time they are to be marketed, pen feed or crate feed the birds in order to have them qualify for A or at least B grade in the milked class. A similar practice is advised for barred rocks or other heavy breeds. A proportion of these breeds should be sent to market in August, September and early October, when they weigh alive around 4 lb. each. Premiums are recommended for those that qualify in the milked class. The premiums suggested by the Dressed Poultry Committee of the Canadian Produce Association for birds in the milked class are: 3 cents per lb. for milkfeds over 3 lbs.; 2 cents per lb. for milkfed A over milkfed B; 3 cents per lb. for selected A over Selected B and for Grade B over Grade C 4 cents per lb.

The fact is that marketing poultry of indifferent quality results in a substantial loss to poultry producers throughout Canada. Neither the domestic nor the British market, which is available for milked poultry, can get a sufficient supply of quality birds. The high price of pounds of Canadian dressed money for poultry producers in Canada is to be made with milked A and milked B birds. The market is too often glutted with low grade birds, never with those of quality which always command a premium.

Roosevelt Ends Sea Vacation

L'ETANG ISLAND, N. B. July 27 — (AP) — President Roosevelt brought his long sea vacation virtually to a close today, sailing his white-hulled schooner Sewanna to this new Brunswick harbor for the night after having luncheon with his wife and friends at Campobello.

Deeply bronzed, the United States President reached Campobello, terminus of his cruise, at 4:15 p. m. A. D.T., but he remained only an hour and was off again. Associates said it was possible he may delay his debarkation at his month-long summer home, overlooking Passamaquoddy Bay, until Wednesday. It was originally planned to end the trip there tomorrow.

The comparatively calm waters off Campobello were reached after a 20-mile run, before a good breeze, from Seal Cove, Grand Manan Island, N. B. It took four hours.

Moors were used to get around the southern point of Grand Manan as three attempts to tack eastward and then north resulted only in pushing the Sewanna closer to the rock-cliffed shore.

Granville Wins Arlington Classic

CHICAGO July 28 — (AP) — Gallant Fox, now nine years old and munching oats down in the blue grass of Kentucky, sent another of his sons out to win the \$35,000 Arlington Classic Saturday.

Granville, three-year-old son of the famous champion of 1930, rolled along into the three-year-old championship of the United States turf before 30,000 spectators at Arlington Park in a blazing finish to defeat his rival, Mr. Bones, by 2 1/2 lengths.

Hollyhood was third, a half length back of Mr. Bones, and four lengths ahead of Cunt Morse, which finished fourth. Memory Book was fifth in the field of 10.

Granville, carrying top weight of 126 pounds, ran the mile and a quarter in 2:03 1-5.

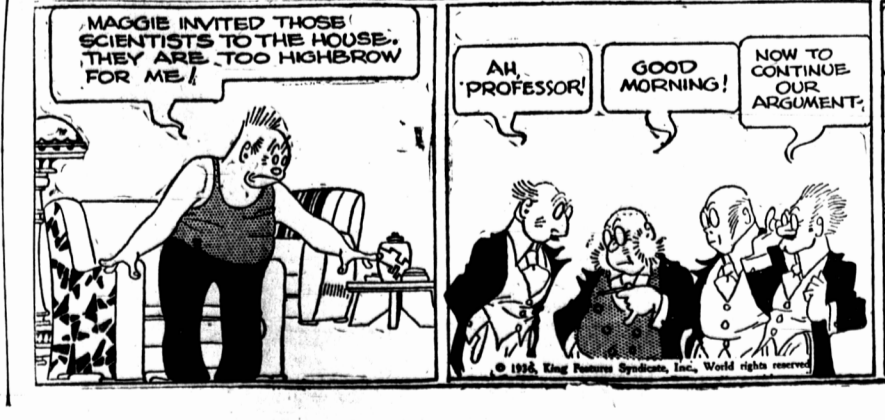
