

Winnipeg Artist Paints Deckhead

LONDON (CP)—The biggest ceiling mural to be commissioned for a British ship in more than 100 years is being painted by Winnipeg artist Tom Luzny.

Covering 460 square feet, the work will decorate the first-class lounge of the Cunard Line's newest ship, the *Sylvania*, due to sail on its maiden voyage to Canada this summer.

The painting depicts Olympian gods with attendant cherubs.

Thirty-one-year-old Luzny works from his Surrey home in a studio furnished with scaffolding and a winch system for reversing and turning the giant work.

Luzny became known five years ago when his murals in the veterans' affairs department offices of Canada House were unveiled. Other major works include murals for the *Sylvania's* sister ships *Saxonia*, *Ivernia* and *Carinthia*.

Luzny served with the Canadian Army as a gunner throughout the Italian campaign. At the same time he worked as a cartoonist and illustrator for the Canadian Army magazine *Maple Leaf*.

Chemist Stirs Weather Data

RUXTON, England (CP)—Sometimes the weather report in this Derbyshire borough says frankly: "We have only the foggiest ideas about today."

Or on a December day the yellow sheet on the wall of the chemist's shop will announce that Buxton's temperature is "joining the Antarctic expedition."

The forecasts and phraseology both come from Edith Pilkington, a lively, white-haired woman in her 50s, who enjoys the job of official meteorologist because she loves to study nature. She dislikes using "officialese," and the racy style of writing gives her a chance for self-expression.

BILLOUS WEATHER

At the end of Christmas week, pressure was recorded as "down-in-the-mouth," and one day in March the bulletin said "we've still no fixed policy, but believe in trying everything once."

The "Buxton weather prospects," as the bulletins are called, fascinate people who visit the borough. Miss Pilkington has had requests for them from all parts of the world.

Miss Pilkington, who has taken an interest in Buxton's weather since she was a schoolgirl, is proud of the barograph presented to her by the air ministry.

She approaches her work partly on a scientific basis, partly on local knowledge built up over the years and she's a firm believer in "waiting for inspiration."

"I have perfected the gentle art of ambiguity when in doubt," she says.

Radio reports are useful, combined with cloud and pressure studies.

Aside from the weather forecasts which take up about two hours a day, Miss Pilkington works as a pharmacist in her brother's chemist's shop.

Her interest in the weather began as a child when she helped her father, who for 25 years tended the weather instruments at the Devonshire Royal Hospital and was honorary meteorologist at Buxton during that time.

Miss Pilkington was the first British woman to receive an official appointment as a meteorologist.

Whole Family Sail Coastwise

QUEBEC (CP)—Operating the motor vessel *St. Leon C.* is a family affair, and daughter Gerardine Cote, a pert 9-year-old, drew the engine-room assignment. Her sister Pauline, 16, is the ship's cook.

Captain Robert Cote has owned and sailed the 133-ton coaster on the St. Lawrence River for 28 years. His sons Leon, the mate, Antoine, the engineer, and Laurent, deckhand, are the other members of the crew.

Gerardine has learned to handle a monkey wrench as easily as her sister looks after the stove, freeing the men for heavier work on deck. Gerardine keeps the noisy 200-horsepower motor chugging faithfully as the vessel moves from one landing to another.

EARLY ARRIVAL

Working from Quebec, the ship carries supplies to lumber camps and villages along the St. Lawrence from early spring until freeze-up. The family spend the winter at their home in La Petite Riviere St. Francois, on the north shore of the river 60 miles downstream from Quebec.

But in midsummer—July and August when schools are closed—there is an addition to the regular crew. Mrs. Cote and the other five children, three boys and two girls, close up the house and move aboard the small vessel.

This year the *St. Leon C.*, after wintering at Petite Riviere, was the first vessel to arrive at Quebec harbor since navigation stopped last fall. Captain Cote became first winner of a new Quebec port award—a silver-headed cane—to

the first coastal vessel captain to arrive each spring. With Cotes from captain down to cabin boys gaining experience every year, the name likely will appear often on the cane's engraved plate in the future.
